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Patenaude Named Quebec Governor

OTTAWA, April 26.—Hon. E. L. Patenaude has been appointed Lieutenant-Governor of Quebec, it was officially announced here today. He succeeds Hon. W. F. Carroll whose term expired some time ago. Hon. Effort Leon Patenaude, born at St. Adolphe, Que., 50 years ago, has had a distinguished career both in the provincial and federal parliaments, having at various times held the Dominion portfolio of inland revenue and secretary of state and minister of justice. He was elected to the provincial Legislature for Laprairie in 1908 and 1912, and resigned to enter the Dominion cabinet as minister of inland revenue in 1915, representing Hochelaga.

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
