**"NO BETTER COUNTRY IN THE WORLD"**

Islanders are becoming alive to the fact that this little gem of a Province has a great future if we will only diligently develop our natural resources. Here is what a Charlottetown editor said the other day: "There is probably no country in the world better adapted for a cereal factory than Prince Edward Island. P. E. Island oats are heavier, per measured bushel, than those of any grown on the continent or even in Europe. The yield last year was something like seven million bushels and this, considering the comparatively small number of farmers engaged in it, about 14,000, is the greatest showing made by any country of which we have authentic statistics. Besides the enormous yield the quality of our oats makes them peculiarly suitable for manufacture into meal or cereal food. The husk is much thinner than that of Ontario or Quebec oats, a peculiarity accounted for by our moist climate as compared with that of the inland provinces." Here, then, is an industry that is not only natural to the province, but which should flourish here to a greater degree than in "any other country in the world." This recalls Tennyson's lines, "To think own self be true," etc. What we want is to be true to ourselves. Let us take hold of sound com-

cial enterprises that can be successfully carried on in our own province, and then we will reap the full benefit. Don't invest your money in "outside" things when a better investment is offering right at home, where you can always be in touch with it and where you can have a shareholder's say in the management. Boats rushed to their assistance and Puccini and his family were taken abroad.

SMELTERS, B. C., September 27.—There is an Indian horse in the Naas River country that eats fish and has a preference for oolichans. Sergeant Pat Phillips, who is known here as a man who always speaks the truth, vouches for the story. The horse, it is said will leave a fish, it is said to eat oolichans. Moreover, he keeps fat and in fine fettle on the diet. It is a great sight, says the truthful sergeant, to see this horse cantering along the beach in the oolichan season. He trots briskly, his head held high in the air, his neck proudly arched, his coat glistening and his eyes flashing as he glances about in search of the modest and succulent oolichan.

**A SENSATION IN MURDER TRIAL.**

SASKATOON, September 26.—A sensation was furnished in the supreme court yesterday, when John Goldspink, testifying in the case for the King versus Dora White, charged with the murder of her husband at Govan, on June 2nd, stated that he heard dull sounds of blows in the adjoining bar-room to his own. A moment later, he said, Mrs. White stuck her head through the curtains separating the two rooms and said to the witness:—"I have fixed him now." Later he arose, so his evidence went, and assisted Mrs. White to carry the body of the dead man into the barn, in the darkness, where it was placed close to the horses' heels.

**GRAND CIRCUIT RACES WELL DRAWN OUT.**

COLUMBUS, Sept. 26.—All three of the class races, which, with the finish of the 2:09 trot that was started on Thursday, comprised the program for the fifth day of Columbus Grand Circuit racing, were split up so that fourteen heats were raced during the afternoon. Compared to that of previous days, the time average was slow. The field was large. Grand Marshall took the one heat needed to settle the 2:09 trot. Bismaya, of the Proctor stable from

Readville, Mass., was favorite in the 2:19 trot, and won after the first heat had been taken by Marta Bellini, the second choice. True Sall fell after the last turn in the opening heat had been reached, but a pile-up of horses following was avoided. Driver Erstaine was able to continue driving Handy Jim in the 2:11 pace.

Judges hesitated about declaring the 2:11 pace completed, after the fifth heat, done in 2:13, was a sprint through the last quarter in 28 1/2 seconds. Had been won by Colonel Franklin. Hydric won the fourth heat, but was out-brushed in the fifth. After a delay, the race was held to be ended.

Great Scott, except in the second heat when a path along the rail was blocked, had no trouble in leading the 2:18 pacers home. He was second choice, Lady Richmond being the favorite.

**FISH BEARS ITS OWN LIGHT.**

SYDNEY, Sept. 27.—A new species of fish having the appearance of an electrically lighted ferryboat has been secured in the Australian bight at the great depth of 350 fathoms. This curious fish, which has 53 brilliant light organs on either side of its body, which itself shines like a mirror, has been named the tudor. It was hauled to the surface by the trawler Endeavor, and will be placed on exhibition at the Austrian Museum at Sydney.

More than a hundred other entirely new varieties were obtained, all the specimens inhabiting the submarine depths being more or less luminous. Several fish of a jet black color, with a skin like velvet studded all over with scintillating encrustations of bluish light were also obtained, some being shaped like a pair of bellows.
