VICTORY FOR THE ISLAND PLAYERS

Pictou and New Glasgow Beaten at Football—A Pleasant Excursion.

At eight o'clock yesterday morning the steamer returned at 8.45 last night, however, she was in addition to the passengers of the morning a cargo of victory won by the Island's representatives in the football field of their opponents. All was joy on board, as much for the victory as for the pleasant day spent. The news of success had been learned in Charlottetown long before the Stanley reached her wharf, and a large crowd assembled on the arrival of the boat. The club yells welcomed the players back again, and congratulations were the order of the hour.

ABBEGWETS VS PICTOU. The football match played in Pictou yesterday between the Abbegets and the Pictou team, was the best game played for many years. Although the score was one sided, it was by no means an easy victory for the Abbegets, who played a fast, snappy, clean game all through. Pictou had a strong scrum every man of them being in perfect trim, and in this point both teams were evenly matched. The Abbegets had the kick-off and in about seven minutes of good snappy work, J. McWilliam scored a very nice run. During the next ten minutes the Abbegets kept the play in Pictou's ten yard, where Pictou succeeded in getting in a little dribble of about ten yards, and a scrum followed when Bethune from a pass succeeded in kicking a goal. In the remainder of the first half the ball never got beyond the Abbegets half line.

The second half was faster than the first, and by the way Pictou played, it seemed as if they were determined to win, but the Abbegets were putting the "genuine article," and after some pretty passing by the halves, Donahoe crossed the line adding three more points to the Abbegets' score. Both teams were now putting great football, every man working hard. Windsor of Pictou made a nice run and was brought down by Trainor. Here scrums followed, and Trainor secured the ball, making a pretty run, when another scrum took place, and Jones secured the ball, kicking it down to Pictou's ten yard line, where the full back fumbled and J. Coyle crossed the line. This try was converted by Brown, after which there was one minute to play and the game ended—the Abbegets winning by a score of 15 to 0.

The passing by the Abbegets halves was something fine. McDonald, the Abbe full-back used good judgment. Jones made some pretty runs. The Abbe forwards played O. K. Dr. McKenzie, of Pictou refereed the game.

VICTORIAS VS. NEW GLASGOW. Game started at three o'clock; New Glasgow wins toss; Victorias kick off. New Glasgow returns the ball and scrums result in centre field. New Glasgow play with a crush; Victorias on defensive. Some pretty work between the Victorias halves resulted in bringing the ball within the New Glasgow's 25 yard line, and Frank McDonald, from a pass from McQuillan made a brilliant dash and got the first score of the day. This was one of the prettiest plays of the day. Frank certainly is a good one, and with a half line of his quality the Island could meet any team. New Glasgow kicked off at the 25 yards line, and Blake, the Vics full-back, returned in fine style. A lot of scrum work was now the order of the day. Pould, McDonald, McQuillan, Duffy, made some short, snappy dashes. Some pretty combination work between the Vics halves resulted in McDonald securing the ball and going over for another try. Bourassa, the star forward, kicked and converted one of the tries. The whistle blew for half time. The second half was a much closer game; the New Glasgow team were determined to score. The Vics played a defensive game. McQuillan went over the line for a try, but the referee would not allow it. There was no scoring in the second half; the Vics played 11 men to the New Glasgow 15 for five minutes.

RUSSIAN GOV'T REFUSE AMNESTY

Alleging it would be Unsafe While Bomb-Throwing Prevails—Premier Will Answer Duma's Address Today—Ministry Must Resign if Peace is to be Maintained.

St. PETERSBURG, May 24.—(Special)—The Government has issued a statement refusing to grant a plenary amnesty, on the grounds that political assassinations continue. The proclamation says: "In the presence of such irreconcilable disposition on the part of the terrorist societies, the Government cannot expose the peaceful, right-thinking section of the population to the danger. "The Government cannot refrain from bringing to justice the terrorists and bomb throwers. "It cannot deliver from punishment by judicial sentences the persons who have committed and are still committing such crimes." Report says the Government will so try to evade the granting of a partial amnesty by leaving the release of political prisoners in the hands of the local authorities, which would place the release of these prisoners in the hands of the very officials who made the arrests. This would undoubtedly excite a storm. Premier Goremykin will tomorrow reply to the Duma's address. The impression is growing that his ministry must resign if a peaceful issue is desired by the Government.

VICTORIA DAY IN THE SCHOOLS

Arbor Day and Empire Day were duly observed at Queen's Square School. After opening the school at 10 o'clock with work suitable to the day, the pupils gathered in the vice-principal's room where a very appropriate program was given, consisting of an opening chorus, songs, recitations and an Essay on Empire Day. On Wednesday, Arbor Day and Empire Day were celebrated in style at West Kent Street school. His Honor Lieut. Governor MacKinnon opened the proceedings promptly on time, and a minute later, accompanied by the Rev. W. H. Sedgewick, Trustee Nash, and Principal Campbell, six hundred throats joined in the first part of the National Anthem. Chairman Nash then explained the reason of the joining of the two days, after which the Arbor Day song, The Fir Tree, was sung. Then followed a dialogue by eight little tots: an address by Rev. Mr. Sedgewick, a cornet solo by Harold Stanley, an essay on the British Empire, by Miss Fannie Gill, a speech by the Lieut. Governor, and a recitation The Union Jack by Clarence Tidmarsh. The order was perfect. Principal Campbell received well-earned eulogiums from Chairman Nash. All joined heartily in singing the National Anthem. At Prince Street School on Wednesday the joint celebration of Victoria and Empire Day was graced by the attendance of a representation of the Daughters of the Empire, His Worship Mayor Paton, several divines, and some of the school trustees. In opening the program Principal Seaman cordially welcomed the guests, thanked the ladies for the beautiful flag sent to the school by them for the occasion, and explained the necessity for putting the two celebrations into one day. A patriotic song was followed by an essay on the Greatness of our Heritage written and read by Miss Ethel Longworth. Miss Myrtle Stanley then recited Men of the North Zone, and was followed by Helen Woodruffe who recited The Canadian Confederacy: after which Lily Riggs did herself and her class great credit in a long and difficult declamation. Kipling's Recessional was then sung, two verses being taken as a solo by Beatrice Dimock.
