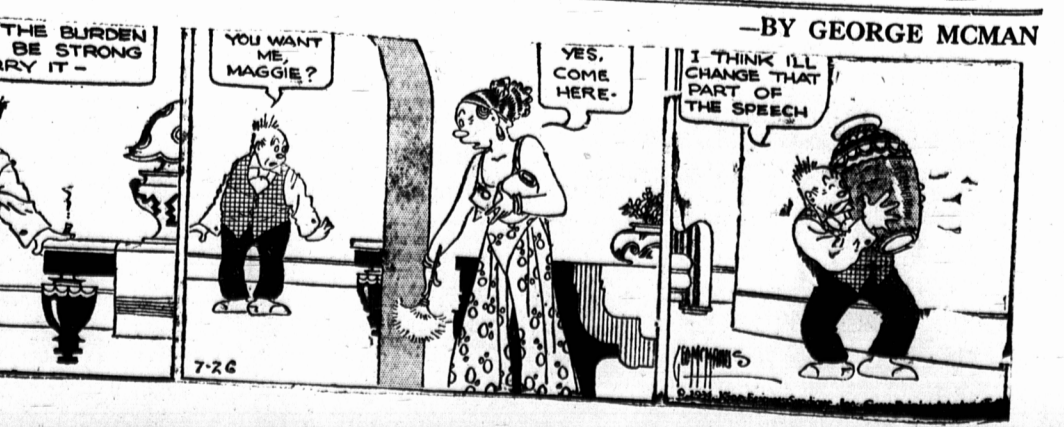

STRANGE SIGHT NOTED MOSCOW, July 25—The strange sight of a religious procession after 17 years of Communism today caused the Communist party newspaper Pravda to suggest a committee to consider the matter. The procession, carrying icons, went from a church at the village of Jaransk near Gorky, erected an altar in the parched dry field of a collective farm, and heard a priest offer prayers for rain. Communist President Sushentzev of the Jaransk village soviet was unable to prevent the religious action as the district executive committee had ordered him not to hinder religious processions to collective fields. However, neighboring village soviet presidents prevented processions in split committee actions. Flour production in Canada for the month of May this year amounted to 1,175,433 barrels, exceeding the amount for the previous month but lower than that for May last year when 1,334,101 barrels were produced. Canada is specifically mentioned in an order issued by the German government respecting the importation of fruit into Germany. ANZAC DAY CELEBRATIONS In Queensland Anzac Day is observed as a strictly close holiday and holy day, yet despite the somewhat mournful atmosphere that must necessarily be associated with it in such circumstances, its observance does not appear to be diminished in any way. This year the commemorative services were equally well attended as in previous years, and the speeches were listened to and applauded with equal enthusiasm. Services were held in all the churches, and at least it must be said that some of the Brisbane clergymen can attain a degree of eloquence in the Anzac services that is not usual in their Sunday addresses. Both the churches and the Returned Soldiers' Association are champions for the solemn observance and a close holiday.

PREMIER GOES TO LONDON The Premier (Mr. Forgan Smith) is on his way to London. The trip was arranged quickly and unexpectedly. Mr. Smith had been to the Premier's Conference and came back a very sick man. The two powerful sugar associations decided that he could be of considerable service to the industry and to the State if he made a hurried trip to London. Queensland has a big sugar surplus and went away with the best wishes of the majority of the people of Queensland. He proposes to be absent for about four months.

LANG PARTY POLITICS Some emissaries of Mr. Lang, New South Wales's extreme Labor leader, came to Queensland some weeks ago with the intention of forming Lang groups in this State. The Country Nationalists wisely said nothing, but left the Lang delegation to the tender mercies of the Queensland Labor Party. And what a reception they got! Terms such as "traitors," "wreckers," and "scabs" were mild. The cruelest cut of all came from the Trades and Labor Council, which mostly wear red, a particular bright color. But the Council rejected the overtures with scorn; and when asked to reconsider the decision its members repeated the rejection in terms that were more definite than polite.
