

Provincial Red Cross Council Meeting

Several ladies from the Summerside Branch, Mrs. J.H. McQuaid from Souris and Judge C. St. Clair Trainor of Montague were among those present at the well attended meeting of the Provincial Red Cross Council held on Tuesday, May 3rd, which was presided over by Mr. R. H. Rogers, Provincial president.

Mrs. Alan Stevenson, National Director of Nutrition Services, who was spending a few days in the Province in the interests of her department, talked to the meeting on the different phases of Nutrition Services and spoke very highly of the work which has been accomplished in Prince Edward Island under the supervision of Mrs. Willam Reddin, M.S.C., who has recently resigned. Mrs. Stevenson said she was doing her utmost to secure a capable successor for Mrs. Reddin so that the work of this department may go forward and be extended.

Progress reports were given by the chairmen of the different standing committees which showed satisfactory expansion in all departments.

Mr. Edwin C. Johnstone stated in his report as Provincial chairman of the campaign that the returns to date had reached almost \$26,000.00 with a great many rural districts still to report.

Lt. Col. Leo F. MacDonald, chairman of the Blood Donor Committee, said that of the approximately 1,000 blood donations received in this Province as the clinics held in December, 1948, and March, 1949, almost 800 transfusions of whole blood had been given as well as about 75 bottles of plasma. He also said that the Mobile Unit from the Maritimes Depot at Halifax would again visit the Province during the last week in June when it is hoped to have clinics at Montague and Souris as well as in Summerside and Charlottetown.
