These talks were all very instructive and will doubtless result on the trial of the canning of meats, fruits and vegetables, by many of the home makers in that vicinity. Perhaps the most interesting fact learned from one of the successful housekeepers there was that of the preservation of air-tight bottles of strawberries with sugar without subjecting them to any heat. After the thanks of the meeting was tendered the speakers of the evening and a social chat was indulged in by those present the meeting adjourned.

—SUPREME COURT.—In the Supreme Court yesterday the case of the King vs. Edgar Cannon, commenced on Monday, occupied the attention of the court most of the day. The taking of evidence was concluded at 12 o'clock, after which Mr. McCallum addressed the jury on behalf of the prisoner. When court resumed after dinner the address of Mr. McQuarrie, K. C. and the Court were delivered, after which the jury retired. They returned in about an hour and a half with a verdict of guilty of conspiring to steal black foxes. The prisoner was remanded for sentence. This morning the trespass case of Austin Ramsay vs. Nelson Ramsay will be taken up before the Chief Justice and a jury. McQuarrie, K. C., for plaintiff; Saunders for defendant. Yesterday the case of the International Harvester Co., an action for debt against Philip McNally, and a trespass case, Walsh vs. Garrigan, were settled without going to trial. They were both jury cases.—J.

The prince then slept for two hours, after which he swam across a pond.
