**FOX BREEDERS ASSOCN. COL. SAM HUGHES' FAREWELL MESSAGE TO CANADIAN TROOPS**

ST JOHN, N.B., Sept. 30.—A fox breeders' association for New Brunswick and eventually uniform classification for all foxes throughout Dominion were the schemes discussed at a meeting of fox men in the Royal Bank building yesterday afternoon. The breeders present yesterday were enthusiastic over the plans, and favoured the formation of a properly regulated organization for the registration of all foxes.

At the present time Prince Edward Island has a breeders' association and are classified according to their specifications. A classification by pedigree is proposed for the new organization.

R. A. March, who is closely connected with the fox business in New Brunswick, took steps to unite the breeders of New Brunswick. He wrote to all the directors and presidents of fox companies and set forth some of his ideas in connection with the plan. His ideas were endorsed by the fox men, and as a result a meeting was held yesterday afternoon.

At the meeting it was pointed out that there were many fine foxes of different varieties in this province, and it was necessary to have them properly classified. The details of the plan were discussed and a committee composed of the following was selected to secure the details of the plans and present them at a later meeting of the breeders:—A. H. Chipman, H. W. McKinnon, chairman, F. E. Williams, Dr T. E. Bishop and R. A. March, secretary.

**ENCOURAGE BRITISH WARRIORS TO MARRY**

Bishops Urged to Reduce Marriage License Fees to Soldiers and Sailors.

LONDON, Sept. 30.—The Archbishop of Canterbury has sent a letter to all the bishops urging them to reduce the marriage fees on the part of the soldiers and sailors summoned to active service might marry before leaving home. The marriage fees aggregate ten dollars, which includes \$2.50 in stamp duty to the Government. The Archbishop has requested the Government to waive the payment of this duty in the case of recruits, and expects that his request will be granted. Many dioceses already have lowered the license fee to \$2.50, and the archbishops are waiting their right to personal fees. The wholesale encouragement of marriages on the part of the soldiers and sailors of Germany, Austria and France has attracted much attention in England, and probably inspired the Archbishop's action.

**ITALIAN BOAT DESTROYED BY MINE.**

ROME, Sept. 30.—A report tells of the destruction of an Italian fishing boat off Rimini by floating mines, and how fishermen mistook the mine for a wire case, which they sought to recover. The mine line they drew the supposed case toward them, and when it touched the craft an explosion occurred. The boat was blown to atoms and nine men were killed. Naval experts express the opinion that hundreds of mines are floating toward the Italian coast from a coast of Austria. As a consequence of the steamship lines operating in Dalmatia, Montenegro, Albania and Greece from Italian ports have suspended sailings. Ships in the Black Sea trade have limited sailings. Steamship interests demand that the Government require prompt and thorough satisfaction from Austria.

**CHILDREN'S HANDS CHOPPED OFF BY GERMANS.**

QUELPH, Ont., September 30.—James Pettit, of York Road, Guelph, received a letter yesterday from an aunt in Stratford Terrace, Leeds, England. One paragraph of the letter states: "We have in our house to care for a little Belgian girl, aged eight, who had both her hands chopped off by German soldiers. Her brother, a little younger, was treated the same, so that he would never be able to handle a rifle."
