25,000th Armored Vehicle Turned Out

MONTREAL, June 27 (CP)—A 60,000-pound tank, the 25,000th armored vehicle turned out for the Canadian Army, was christened at a public ceremony Saturday by Sgt. Maj. Norma Wilken of the C.W.A.C.

Thirty members of each of the three women's auxiliary services formed a guard of honor at the ceremony. The christening was held in the town hall on Thursday evening with eight tables playing. Ladies prize was won by Mrs. Wilken and Gent's by Mr. E. Lewis MacDonald with consolation prizes going to Mrs. P. J. MacNeil and Mr. MacDonald.

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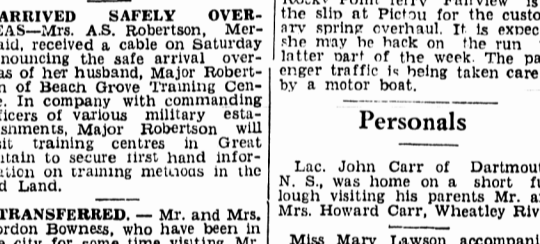


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Baptist Association Services Conclude
