NIPPON SALAD

1 can of crab meat, 1 dozen stuffed olives, French dressing, capers or sweet pickles, 2 cups of celery, seasonings, mayonnaise, lettuce.

Pick over the crab meat very carefully as there are so many small flake-like pieces of tendon in it. Marinate it with French dressing and let it stand aside for an hour or two before serving so as to absorb the dressing.

Put the celery into dice, and the olives into slices. Mix the celery with the crab meat, turn on to a dish or into a salad bowl lined with the lettuce, and pour the mayonnaise over all. Garnish with the olives and capers. These last can be omitted and a few chopped sweet pickles used in their place.—Pictorial Review.

HENS OF GOOD BREED PAY BEST

Everybody knows that if you invest in the best to be had you are more likely to get better results than if you buy what is cheap and not up to the standard. If you buy good hens, of a good, well known breed, raised by a dealer known to be good, you have every chance of future success; or the other hand, do not go in for rare and probably delicate breeds. Good, strong, hardy birds will pay you best in the end. Start in a small way, but not too small. A small poultry plant, run up in a ramshackle and careless way, will give more trouble in the end than any well made intensive house. It seems a waste of energy not to begin on a fair sized scale. Very tiny plants take up really more time, as they have to be cleaned oftener.

SAVORY BUTTER SANDWICHES

One cup of butter, one teaspoon of made mustard, one teaspoon of anchovy paste, yolks of two eggs. Beat the butter until creamy and add to it the yolks of the eggs, which have been previously cooked and passed through a sieve. Mix well with the mustard and anchovy paste. Salt is not likely to be needed for these sandwiches as naturally the anchovy will supply this condiment; but a generous allowance of paprika or freshly ground pepper should be added. Use French bread and have it cut in little thicker than is common. In making these, or indeed any sandwiches, it should be remembered that oblongs or triangles are the best shapes, as the bread cuts to better advantage so.—Pictorial Review.
