Drastic Slump in Stage Salaries

LONDON, Sept. 26.—The scramble for work on the stage, accentuated recently by the failure of many plays and the falling off of the number of touring companies, has resulted in remarkable decreases in the salaries of many actors and actresses. One of the biggest drops has been from £145 a week to £25 a week in the case of a favorite musical comedy actress. A manager concerned in both London and provincial companies has long had contracts are still drawing £300 and £400 a week, but others have to play for less if they want employment. The people most affected by the 'slump' in salaries are those who have been earning between £30 and £50 a week.

SOME BRIEFS FROM IRELAND
(By Dominion News Service.) DUBLIN, Sept. 26.—Mr. David O'Brien, of Ballysilla, County Tipperary, has died at the patriarchal age of 100 years. He remembered well the O'Connell meetings, and had vivid recollections of the peasants dying by the ditches. There are complaints of the great dearth of unemployment in the town of Kildare and district surrounding it. A great number of men from this district formerly were accustomed to constant employment at the Curragh Camp, but very few are employed now from the district, with the result, as there is very little other employment, the workers and their families are suffering much. Reports from many parts of the North Rosecommon show that the heavy rain for the past couple of months has worked havoc with all classes of crops. Big tracts of meadow yet remain uncut, while hay-cocks in low-lying lands are practically submerged. The potato crop has not a 50 per cent. return, and the potato crop is the poorest for years. Everything points to poor harvest. Mrs. Tennant's two fine fee-simple residential holdings at Melar-nance and Knockbril, County Tipperary, have been sold. The first was sold to James Darnody, Rath-erard, Cashel, for £2,500 and fees (acreage, 245 statute acres), and the second to John Skehan, Cashel, for £6,250 and fees (acreage, 163 statute acres). M. F. Maher, auctioneer, withdrew from sale at £13,010 (the reserve not having been reached) M. Dwyer's holding at Ballymore, Goldcross, containing 229 acres. The Civic Guard barracks at Cloone Lethin was raided by a party of armed men. One of the Guards, putting his head out of the window, was fired at. The barrack door was forced open and the Guards' bicycles taken away by the men. A drapery establishment in the village was also raided and £7 worth of goods carried off. This is the second raid in the village within the past fortnight.

STONE WORE SMOOTH WITH PILGRIMS' KISSES
(By Dominion News Service) CORK, Sept. 26.—Continual kissing is wearing away the magic Stone of Blarney. After years of comparative neglect the world of lovers are at it again—a good omen, surely, of peace and good will coming back to Ireland. It is a big stone, but it is being worn smooth and hollow by countless millions of kisses. Today, after a lapse of twenty years, I saw scores of people performing the dangerous ritual, and it seemed to me since my former visit the stone had suffered some partial diminution. It is only a small matter of thousands of centuries before it is kissed completely away.

Three girls came with us today, says our correspondent and one of them, looking down, was so frightened that she could do no more than blow a hand-kiss from a safe distance. The other two, Americans, did not hesitate. We men were each entrusted with the stone so long and so girl kissed the stone on six different occasions; when the opportunity for a proposal had come he found himself each time without inspiration and as tongue-tied as before. At last he contrived to take the girl to Blarney and, leaving her in one of the beautiful groves which surround the place, he rushed off to the battlements, kissed it, and, coming quickly down, proposed and was accepted. Soon he was kissing something more responsive than a stone. Some say that the stone got its enchantment from the magic of some mediaeval witch. Others declare that it is the very stone which served Jacob for a pillow when he saw the vision of angels ascending and descending on the heavenly ladder. Whether the legends are true or false, lovers of all nations will go on believing in its magic and will continue to kiss it.
