## DEMAND FOR CHILDREN TO ADOPT EXHAUSTS SUPPLY

(Canadian Press) WINNIPEG, Man., Jan. 12.—The demand for children to adopt has outrun the supply of tots and babies in Winnipeg institutions. Already many orders have been booked for the forthcoming children of 1932, according to Miss Mildred McMurray, head of the provincial child welfare adoption department.

Many people, said Miss McMurray, are apparently moved by an irresistible impulse to have a "little fairy in their house for Christmas." Applications begin to pour in to the institutions and government departments early in November. During the past year over 1,000 letters were received from residents of this province, Saskatchewan, Alberta and Ontario.

Whatever the prevailing taste of gentlemen, foster-parents continue to prefer blondes, Miss McMurray revealed. For one person indifferent to the sex or color of the child there are nine who consider nothing but a fair-haired, blue-eyed girl. Boys run a bad second. The adoption prospects of the dark-eyed mites are as dark as their coloring.

Hard times have not checked the progress of adoption but rather have spurred people in moderate circumstances to take on new responsibilities, Miss McMurray believed. For the last fiscal year there were 193 final adoptions put through by the department as against 124 in the preceding year.

and Charlottetown for some time. This will now make the passenger service permanent so that the public may now be assured of a quick trip to and from the mainland when and as desired. The load limit of mail to be carried by the air service is 400 pounds so that this will only include the letter portion of the mail, registered mail and a fair proportion of the daily papers.

The Postmaster General in his orders states that ordinary rates of postage will apply to the air mail service. The mail plane will leave Moncton at or about 11 a.m., after the arrival of the Maritime Express from Montreal and train 44 from St. John. It will proceed directly to Summerside where mails will be exchanged and the mail from all points west of Summerside will also be taken on. The plane will then come to Charlottetown and will land at the Upton Airport and will leave on return to Moncton about 12.45 p.m., or not later than one o'clock. The mail will be closed at the Charlottetown post office shortly after the arrival of the trains from points east and south and all local mail to connect with the plane should be posted not later than twelve noon.

The service which has so promptly been given by the Postmaster-General will no doubt be greatly appreciated by the people of this Province. The Provincial Department of Public Works is co-operating by sending the snow plough to make a passable road for cars from this City to the Airport. The plough will start its work early this morning.

# Sensational Case In Honolulu

(Associated Press) WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 12.—Conditions at Honolulu reaching a climax in the sensational Fortescue-Masse case today aroused the Senate to demand a justice department investigation of the administration and enforcement of criminal law in Hawaii.

A resolution calling for the inquiry, proposed by Chairman Bingham of the territories committee, was adopted. Another measure proposing an inquiry by the committee was introduced by Senator McKellar, of Tennessee and may come up today.

During the day, Admiral William V. Pratt, chief of naval operations, asserted a change of venue should be granted for the trial of Mrs. Granville Fortescue and her son-in-law, Lieutenant Thomas M'ssie of the navy, on charges arising from the killing of an Hawaiian native, who was awaiting a second trial on charges of attacking Mrs. M'ssie. A mistrial resulted the first time he was arraigned.

# President Von Hindenburg Must Contest Election

BERLIN, Jan. 12.—(A.P.)—Both Adolf Hitler, National Socialist leader, and Dr. Alfred Hugenberg, leader of the Nationalists, refused last night to give their support to the government in extending for one year the term of office of President Paul Von Hindenburg. They informed Chancellor Heinrich Bruening, who had hoped to avert the turmoil of an election this spring by having the Reichstag prolong the President's tenure, that they could not be a party to the plan because they considered it a violation of the constitution.

It was understood that both the Nazi leader and Dr. Hugenberg were writing letters to Dr. Bruening explaining that they revered the aged Von Hindenburg and wanted to see him re-elected, but they insisted that it be done constitutionally, that is, by popular vote.

entomologist this fear is groundless. Efforts to induce Great Britain to lift the potato embargo are complicated. Canada has an embargo against British potatoes because of the "black wart" which infests some parts of that country. If Canada lifted its embargo as reciprocity for similar action by Great Britain, United States automatically would ban Canadian seed potatoes from that market. United States has a statute which prohibits the importation of potatoes from any country where the black wart exists or from any country which permits the importation of potatoes from any such country. For several weeks negotiations have been carried on by Hon. Robert Weir, Minister of Agriculture, for a solution of the problem. Hon. G. H. Ferguson, Canadian High Commissioner in Great Britain and Hon. W. D. Herridge, Canadian Minister to Washington have approached the governments of Great Britain and United States, but so far without success.
