RUM RAIDS.—The activities of the Temperance Alliance and the employment of two Thiel detectives to discover and expose the various "beer-joints" alleged to exist in this city have not tended to diminish the efforts of the local police in the cause of prohibition. The steamer is at present returning to St. John's from a trip she made to Brazil, and she then goes to New York to take up the Red Cross service. The Morwenna has been engaged to fill the vacancy of the Stephano for a sealing voyage for which she is now being fitted.

COURT OF CHANCERY.—Before the Honourable R. Fitzgerald, Vice-Chancellor the Court of Chancery yesterday heard the case of George Burge vs. James J. Burge. The suit was brought to set aside two deeds of twenty-five and fifty acres, respectively, on Lot 42, and also an agreement made respecting another fifty acres of land known as the Homestead. After the evidence for the plaintiff had been given, Mr. J. Johnston, on behalf of the defendant, urged that the case be dismissed on the ground that the plaintiff had not made out sufficient equity to entitle him to relief. The case will be resumed today. Messrs. W. S. Stewart, K. C., and A. McDonald, K. C., appeared for the plaintiff, while Mr. Johnston represented the defendant.

MRS. A. A. MCLEAN.—Entered into rest at Hampton on the 26th of January, Mrs. A. A. McLean, relict of the late Rev. Allan McLean, and youngest daughter of the late Honorable James Dingwell, Bay Fortune. She deceased had been residing in Amherst during the winter months with her sons and spending the summers at her old home on the island. She came home as usual last summer but failing health prevented her from returning to Amherst for the winter. She is survived by six sons: Robert in Vancouver, James, Gordon, Abijah, Geddie, and Harry in Amherst, and two daughters, Mrs. Found, who lives near Clifton, New London, and Mrs. Hardy of Graham's Road. The funeral was held on the 28th ult., Rev. Mr. Hattie officiating. Interment was at Crapaud Public Cemetery. The sons, with the exception of Robert and Harry, came over to the island to attend the burial.

Mr. E. McKinnon of Hampton received a telegram Tuesday containing the information that the frozen corpse of Mr. William Myers was found in Candle, Alaska, and that he perished while on the trail. The body would be interred on the 4th of Feb. Mr. McKinnon has telegraphed to Nome to find out all the particulars of his terribly painful death. Mr. William Myers was a resident of Hampton before going to Alaska about fifteen years ago and has since visited his old home, being here as recently as six years ago. In Alaska he followed the trade of a placer miner, and had extensive holdings in gold and coal mines about Candle and White Horse passes, and the last letter he ever wrote stated that he had found a fortune. While attending his mining operations in Alaska he met Miss L. B. Hayes, a Kentucky girl, who went out there to teach school. Myers had planned to emerge from the wilderness about Christmas time and marry the young school teacher. It is believed that Miss Hayes is now in Seattle.

This little bit of history from the miner's life reveals a romance made pathetic by a lonely death on the trail in the wilderness of that faraway northern land. He has an only brother, Mr. George Myers, at Hampton, and a sister, Mrs. D. H. Haslam of Bathurst, who was the first acquainted with her brother's death, and who sent the telegram to Mr. McKinnon.

AT THE Y. M. C. A.—The Y. M. C. A. Committee in charge of the Sunday afternoon services at the Association building, have secured for next Sunday Rev. T. P. Fullerton, D. D., who will speak on the subject, "The Sacredness of the Ballot." This is a theme of very great importance in view of the coming civic elections. Brown, re-elected; Vice-President, Mrs. Hornby; Secretary, Mrs. Hornby; Treasurer, Mrs. Hornby; and fifteen and nineteen dollars and fifty cents being placed to their credit. The following account will show some of the work done by the Hospital in 1913:—Patients admitted 32, of which 83 were non-paying patients; surgical operations, 220, cured 250 improved, 79, incurable, 10, not treated 26, Deaths, 12. The President has also had a room furnished in memory of her sister, the late Mrs. M. A. Harrington.

MacGaughey and Mrs. Lena Lindsay of Haverhill and Miss Margaret at home, also five sons, John of New York, Charlie of Montana, Peter of Freetown, William H. and Thomas E. at Emerald Jet.

The remains followed by a long and solemn procession were laid to rest at Freetown Cemetery, the last sad rites being performed by the pastor Rev. Mgr. Gillis, assisted by Rev. Dr. Smith, Iona.
