CITY AND COUNTRY

Guardian Correspondents Everywhere.

In connection with Thanksgiving Day, excursion return tickets will be issued by the Prince Edward Island Railway from and to all stations at one way first-class fare on November 27th and 28th, good to return up to and on December 2nd, 1901.

Those engaged in chicken fattening in this Province, will read with interest than some of the shipments made this year sold in Liverpool wholesale at 14c per pound and net returns were equal to \$1.31 per pair of chickens at Montreal. Professor Robertson says the export trade in fattened chickens is bound to become a very large one, and the demand will greatly increase as soon as consumers know the very superior quality of the fattened chickens and the high percentage of edible portion on each bird.

It is a well known fact that when statistics are submitted the cheese industry of this province will be much smaller this year than last. This is due to the lack of grazing. Manufacturers and all interested will be pleased, however, to read the following: Though the cheese export figures this season up to Nov. 18th show a falling off of 175,418 boxes as compared with last season the dairy exports as a whole of the Dominion show an increase this season. The increase in butter exports via Montreal and Boston are calculated in the Department of Agriculture to be equivalent to 194,784,400 pounds of milk, while the decrease in cheese exports is equivalent to 140,834,400 pounds of milk. Farmers seem to consider a better relative price is obtained for butter, and there seems to have been a decrease in the consumption of cheese this season in the cheese markets. These in a general way, are looked upon as the explanation of the decrease in cheese exports.

Jacob Gould Schurman, P. E. Island's energetic president of Cornell University, has many friends who are busy just now with a story which came down from Ithaca. One of the faculty of the Cornell Medical College tells it this way: Ever since President Schurman was a member of the Philippines Commission the heavy mail which naturally comes to the head of a university has been largely increased. Hundreds of people who want positions in the islands deluge him with letters, taking it for granted that he can make appointments at will. Then there are many other people who do not believe that a college president should dabble in politics, and who do not hesitate to tell him so. In consequence, President Schurman's mail is varied and interesting. He enjoys reading the mail, and tries to glance over most of the letters which come to him. There was one a few weeks ago however, which he could not read. It was written in characters utterly beyond his comprehension. Returned it upside down, but could make nothing more of it. Send it to Professor Schmit for translation, he said to his secretary at last. I believe it is written in Persian. 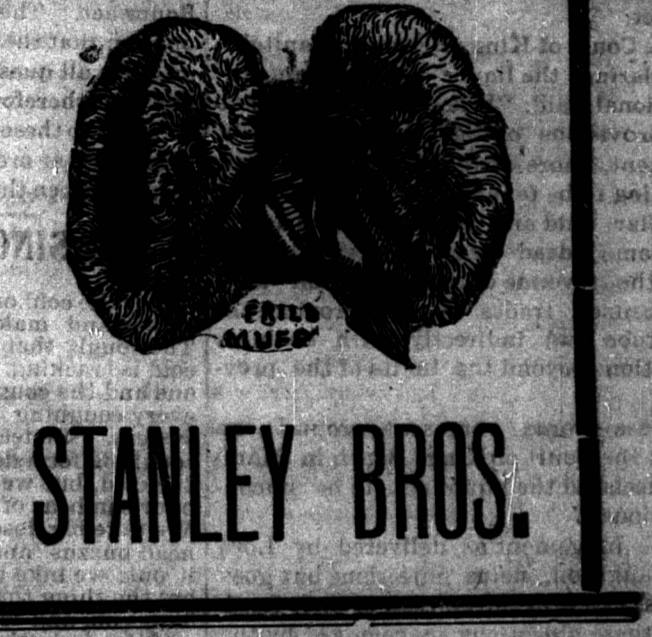
