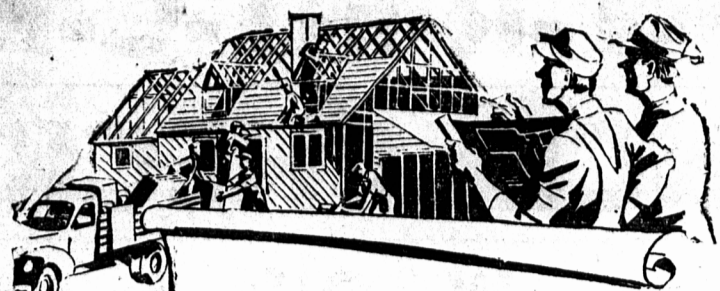

—PASSION WEEK SERVICES.—The Passion Week Services in Summerside were in the First Baptist Church on Wednesday evening with the minister, Rev. E. J. Bar-rass, presiding and Mr. J. H. Leuty, organist. The guest speaker, Rev. N. Hamilton, continued his theme on Prayer, stating it was a disclosure on the part of God and discovery on the part of man. The text of the sermon was in John 1:29: Behold the Lamb of God which taketh away the sin of the world. In the opening remarks in part, the speaker said "Let us think of the sinless sacrifice of Christ; His accusers couldn't convict Him; and Pilate found no fault in Him. Jesus had taught his followers to search for truth, so if He had had any faults, they would have been discovered." He stated that in the past twenty years there had been a marked increase in the number of scientists who have become firm believers in Jesus Christ. Man had from the beginning sacrificed something of value in order to receive higher good; and before the days of Jesus, man had thought God to be an exacting ruler, whose wrath must be appeased with blood; but Jesus, as a loving Father, and He, Himself, made the final sacrifice for the sin of the world. In ancient times the Jews used a scapegoat to get rid of the sins and today people are inclined to make a scapegoat of a person who had made a mistake, instead of getting rid of the sin that caused the mistake to be made. Mr. Hamilton in conclusion remarked that if a man cannot forgive the sin of another, he cannot pray the Lord's Prayer, for in so doing he would be calling a curse upon his own head. It costs to forgive sin; and think what it cost God to forgive the sin of the world. God was in Christ reconciling the world unto Himself because He loved mankind.—S.

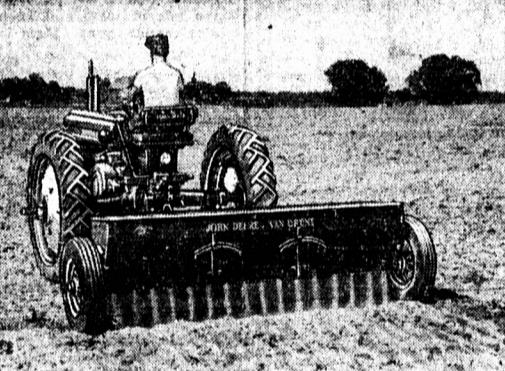
