..*COAL LADEN.—The schooner Arizona arrived in port with 200 tons coal for the P. E. I. Ry. S

..*HAYING.—The past few days have been excellent for haying. There is a considerable quantity of hay in this locality still ungathered. S

..*CONGRATULATIONS to Miss Mary McIntyre, Montague, who has been awarded the Governor General's Bronze Medal for general proficiency in the Montague High School, for the year ending June, 1918.—B.

..*TO FACILITATE SHIPPING.—It is reported that a larger steamer than the Enterprise will be placed on the Pictou, Souris, Magdalen route this fall, the present boat being inadequate to move the increasing freight on this route.—S.

..*FOR MAGDALENES.—The schr. Senator Snowball cleared for Magdalen Island with 20 cords wood and 60 bags sawdust, shipped by Mr. H. H. Acorn. Mr. Acorn is shipping a large quantity of cordwood and sawdust for smokers in Magdalen Islands. S

..*JOINS AMERICAN ARMY.—Mr. J. Harvey McDonald of Boston arrived in Souris this week with two horses, which he leaves with his father, Mr. Alfred McDonald of Farmington. Mr. McDonald who has joined the American Army gave up his laundry business in Boston in which he was very successful and cheerfully joined the Army. In this connection we might state that he is one of a family of eight sons and four daughters all living and doing well.—S.

..*INTERESTING CASE.—A case in which quite a number of farmers in Rollo Bay and Bay Fortune were tried lately in Souris before Messrs. M. McCormack and A. Currie. It seems that an erroneous opinion prevails among many farmers that the water front of their farms extends to low water mark and that they have exclusive rights to all seaweed and traffic, even to the extent of running a water fence to low water mark, thus excluding all traffic and a private right to seaweed landed by the tide, whereas a decision was rendered some years ago by Sir Wilfrid Sullivan in the Supreme Court in Charlottetown. Judges Hodgson and Fitzgerald concurring that a farmer's rights were only above high water mark, and that all rights between low water and high water both to collect seaweed and ordinary traffic were equally the common rights of the public. The case referred to was Riley vs. Campbell. Riley erected a water fence shutting off travel opposite his farm and Campbell was sued for breaking through the fence and passing through. Decision was a non-suit. S

MONCTON, August 15.—A largely attended meeting of the maritime publishers was held at Sackville yesterday afternoon. The maritime publishers re-organized as the Maritime Division of the Canadian Press Association. There were some present who were opposed to the affiliation with the Canadian Press. The meeting was overwhelmingly in favor of continued affiliation. Ralph H. Watts, vice-president of the Canadian Press, was placed in the chair, and affiliation was championed by Messrs. A. R. Coffin and J. T. Hawke, one of the directors.

Several interesting papers were read by Messrs. C. C. Avar, J. P. Malaney, W. F. C. Parlee. It was decided that the regular meeting shall be held at Truro on October 23 and 24 next. Messrs J. T.
