REV. DR. CARMAN'S WORDS:

There was once a Canadian public man highly successful as a leader, who boasted that "though he was no saint himself he generally had one or two saints in his cabinet." The reply of a political opponent was that the cabinet so composed reminded him of a book which a young lady of his acquaintance frequently took with her to church. The cover was that of a prayer book, while within was the latest and most objectionable novel whose pages the lady perused while apparently engaged with her devotions.

In like manner to the politician first above referred to, the distillers, brewers and liquor sellers, in their opposition to prohibition and their advocacy of the license system, are quite willing to admit that they are not, and do not profess to be saints, but their proud boast is that some eminent saints share their views as to the right method of dealing with intoxicants! And they are, unfortunately, able to quote the name of Reverend Doctor This as openly opposed to prohibition, and the name of Rev. Doctor That as the apologist for license. And thus we have again the meretricious novel enclosed between the sanctimonious covers of the prayer book.

But there is this difference. The inanimate covers are irresponsible for the profanation they unconsciously suffer. The ministers of religion who lend themselves to cover up the wickedness of the liquor traffic, and furnish arguments which may be quoted in their names in every tavern and by every rum organ in the community, are fully aware of what they are doing and what purpose they serve.

The "saints" who on the rum traffic can claim as cloaks for its iniquities are fortunately few, and in many cases of doubtful sanctity. While on the other side there are many of undoubted piety and eminence who are the outspoken and unswerving advocates of prohibition and who fail not to denounce the principle of selling permits for wrong-doing and deriving a revenue from rum. One of these we have now in mind is Rev. Dr. Carman, eminent as a scholar, a teacher, a preacher and an administrator, and known throughout Canada as a patriotic opponent of all the forms of evil which assail the family and the state.

Dr. Carman last year made an address to the General Conference of the Methodist Church with special reference to the then approaching plebiscite. In the course of this address he made the following reference to the question of revenue derived from the traffic.

"And yet it boasts it pays seven millions of dollars into the Canadian revenue. Is the Government guiltless? Are the people guiltless? Are we human? Are we honorable? Are we brotherly? Certainly we are not Christian when we raise our revenue out of murder and arson and robbery, out of ignorance and insanity; seeking poverty and disease; a revenue out of fallen men and women, desolated homes and the tears of the wives and mothers, and the wail of the orphan. There is nothing wise about this; there is nothing manly, nothing noble. Our statesmen should show themselves worthy of the name in this matter as did a Gladstone, a Tilley, a Galt, or should leave the Government to men who can carry it on without debauching the people into drunkards and sots.

"Alas! alas! for us as a people, if we force our Government in partnership with distillers and saloonkeepers to secure public funds. How, then, about the ballot-box? Canada, body and soul, schools, churches and homes, agriculture, commerce, manufacture and are sold to Bacchus and his minions

for \$7,000,000 grog money! In that day it will be a proud thing to be Canadian. God and true religion are at war with the liquor traffic. The free moral and responsible personality is at war with the liquor traffic. The genuine Church of Jesus-Christ is at war with the liquor traffic."

We commend these words to our readers. They have the ring of truth and sincerity, and no rum advocate can shelter himself behind a saint of the pattern of Rev. Dr. Carman.

I respectfully ask a discerning public to withhold their judgement until an impartial and independent investigation is held, which I understand will shortly take place.

I have no hesitation in saying, that so far as the general management is concerned, the inmates at Falconwood are better cared for and more kindly treated now than they ever were before. I will not enter into details now, pending an investigation, which I do hope and trust will not be a one-sided one, but which will take cognizance under oath of all matters penetrating into each department of the institution; viz; the immediate care of the patients by the attendants, the food supply, the heating apparatus, the sanitary conditions, supervisor's department, and last but not least the medical department.
