STRENGTH OF GOVT. WILL BE TESTED

CAPE TOWN, South Africa, Jan. 23—(Canadian Press Cable)—Strength of Prime Minister J. B. M. Hertzog's Nationalist Government, under fire from two sides for several weeks, will be tested tomorrow in the House of Assembly by a vote of no confidence. The vote will be moved by General Jan Christian Smuts, former Prime Minister and veteran leader of the South African party who has assailed the government's economic policy for more than a year. It is expected to reveal what success, if any, Timmermans, returned Supreme Court Judge, has had in recent efforts to alienate support of some Nationalist members from the Government.

Trade Revival Is Looked For

(Special to The Guardian) MONCTON, N. B., Jan. 23—The outlook for revival of trade which to a great extent is dependent upon settlement of the war debts is very hopeful consequent upon the announcement of arrangements for a meeting between the British and United States governments to consider the matter declared Sir Newton J. Moore, President of the Dominion Steel and Coal Co., when passing through Moncton this afternoon on the Ocean Limited of the Canadian National Railways enroute to Halifax and Sydney. Sentiment in the United States he believes is more favorable to a settlement particularly in the last few days than it has been for some time past. Speaking of conditions in Europe, Sir Newton, who has just recently returned from Great Britain, stated the old commercial seems to be forging ahead and making progress. He found also that Germany is making headway, he having made a trip to Germany while overseas, visiting Berlin. While there he noted a betterment in business conditions. In commenting upon the outlook for the steel industry he stated that Japan has been exporting steel rods and nail about according to the late Archdeacon's own wishes.

Escapes But Is Later Killed

(Associated Press) BATON ROUGE, La., Jan. 24—Stanley "Swede" Anderson, St. Louis underworld character who escaped from United States marshals yesterday by leaping through the window of a swiftly moving train north of New Orleans, was shot and killed near here today as he sought to flee northward on a freight train. He was shot down by a deputy sheriff. He was quickly identified by a half dozen letters in his pockets and by injuries about the face, suffered in yesterday's leap through the window of a drawing room in which St. Louis marshals were bringing him to New Orleans to face charges in connection with the alleged murder of a Louisiana dry informer two years ago.

As a commercial traveler in every section he was always a cordially welcomed visitor, esteemed for his sterling qualities and the friendliness which was an outstanding characteristic. Members of the firm, speaking of his death last night, expressed deep regret and paid him a high tribute of praise as one who was very popular among his associates, and one well trusted and highly valued in the service of the company. Mr. Huestis was a member of St. John's Lodge of the Masonic Order and a member also of the Fairville Baptist Church. He is survived by his wife, four sons, Ralph J. Huestis, of Manawagonish road; H. Gordon, Ernest N. and Berton W., all at home, and his mother, Mrs. N. C. Huestis, of Yarmouth, N. S. He also leaves two brothers, R. M. Huestis, of Toronto, and Lee Huestis of Truro, N.
