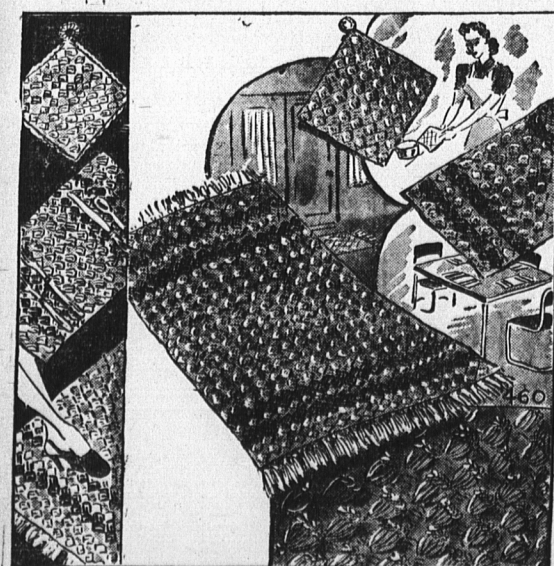
LACKING NERVE.

QUESTIONS OF REMARRYING IS INDIVIDUAL PROBLEM

Widow Should Give Careful Consideration To The Question, Especially The Future Of Her Own Children

A discussion of whether widows should remarry seems a trifle academic, since they are noted for their prowess as husband-getters. Nevertheless, the problem does occur, and one charming young creature in her early thirties, with three small boys, a nice little home and a comfortable wage of insurance money, is debating whether she shall marry again, or stay single and devote her life to her children.

There are a thousand different angles to the question, each one plausible and a thousand cogent arguments can be urged with equal force and equal convincings both for and against it.

A widow faces no such difficult decision. All the circumstances in the case urge him toward remarrying, because a home without a wife at the head of it is like a ship without a wheel. He can't attend to his business and look after his children at the same time, and his need of a housekeeper and a mother for his motherless children is so imperative that there is no room for argument about whether he should take Number Two or not.

Children Must Be Considered

But the widow can make a home for her children. She can keep them clean and well fed and taken care of, and if she has enough money upon which to support her family, marriage is a thing she can take or leave alone as she chooses. A husband is a luxury and not a necessity.

For a woman so placed, the chief argument against remarrying is the danger that the new husband will mistreat her children. Cruel stepfathers are just as common as cruel stepmothers. Men are just as likely to be jealous of their stepchildren as a woman is, and when this occurs it not only wrecks the happiness of the child but of the mother.

When they are his own children, a man applauds their mother's devotion to them. He may leave her a little about his nose being put out of joint by the baby and about her thinking of Tom and Sally and John, but in his secret heart he likes to see her cuddling them and making much of them. But when it is another man's children it is a different story.

He isn't willing to yield priority to them. He isn't willing to be sacrificed to them, and their mother's love for them fills him with a bitter jealousy than he could ever feel toward any man rival. And he begrudges with all his soul having to support another man's children and pay for leaving their addens out and their teeth straightened.

The Stepphater's Attitude

The stepfather's jealousy often makes him deal harshly with his stepchildren. He isn't willing to make any excuses for them or grant them any of the indulgences of youth. Often he makes their mother afraid to show them any affection. Often they are driven from home.

Often their characters are warped for life by the injustice shown them, and when a mother sees her helpless little children being thus mistreated her heart is indeed broken. No woman's lot is sadder than that of her first marriage.

On the other hand, children soon grow up and leave the home nest, and no right-thinking mother would bind her sons and daughters to her with all his soul having to support another man's children and pay for leaving their addens out and their teeth straightened.

But When Children Grow Up

A woman's children have generally gone about the business of life for themselves while she is still in the early forties. This leaves her a long life of loneliness and emptiness if she has remarried a widow for the sake, and that makes the sacrifice seem out of all proportion to the problem. So the question of whether a widow with children should remarry remains one that every woman must answer for herself, but, if she does, she should pick her second husband far more carefully than she did her first, for her children's happiness is involved as well as her own.

How to Draw Fashions Shown By Clever Charts

PROPORTIONS FOR THE FACE

"Did YOU do that? It looks as professional as the fashions in the papers and magazines!" You may be surprised yourself at what a little chart instruction may do for your artistic talents—starting you, perhaps, on a profitable fashion art career. Little things you couldn't seem to get right begin to shape up.

The chart in our sketch shows the trick of drawing a beautiful face. You make an oval and divide it in half, vertically. Then you divide it in half horizontally, drawing the eyes on this line.

Now divide the lower half of the face into horizontal fifths, placing the nose two-fifths down and the mouth three-fifths down from the eye line. For contour, indent at eye line and keep chin lines angular. Sketch hair in simply, aim for a soft look.

Other charts show the proportions of the fashion figure (eight times as high as the head) and how—with five simple guide lines—you can "block in" graceful poses.

THE COOK'S CORNER

Baking Powder Biscuit (Basic Recipe)

2 cups flour
4 tablespoons baking powder
2-3 cup milk
1-2 teaspoon salt
Mix and sift dry ingredients. Cut in the shortening until the mixture resembles fine bread crumbs. Add milk slowly to form a soft dough. Roll on a floured board. Pat or roll to 1/2 inch thickness. Cut. Bake 12 minutes at 450 F.

(Variations)

1. Tomato Biscuits— Substitute tomato juice for milk.
2. Emergency Biscuits— Increase milk to 3/4 cup. Drop to spoonfuls instead of rolling.
3. Raisin Biscuits— Add 1-2 cup raisins to Emergency Biscuits.
4. Cheese Biscuits— Add 1-3 cup grated cheese.
5. Cheese Fingers— To bake a recipe add 1-3 cup grated cheese. Roll to 1-3 inch thickness. Cut in pieces 1x1-1/2 inch.
6. Pinwheel Biscuits— Roll dough to 1/4 inch thickness, keeping it rectangular in shape. Brush with melted butter, sprinkle with cinnamon and 1-4 cup white sugar. Roll like a jelly roll. Cut slices 3-4 inch thick. Place on a greased baking sheet. Cut side down. Bake 12 minutes at 450 F.
7. Buttercrunch Rolls— Use 1/2 cup brown sugar in above recipe, omitting white sugar and cinnamon.
8. Maple Biscuits— Pour 1 cup maple syrup in a baking pan. Bring to a boil. Place plain biscuits in hot syrup. Bake 12 minutes at 400 F.
9. Nutbread— Turn into 2-2 cup nuts to basic recipe. Let stand 20 minutes. Bake 45 minutes at 375 F.
10. Jam Jennies— Cut biscuits 1-2 inch thick. Make a deep impression in top of each. Place 1 teaspoon jam in each. Bake 12 minutes at 400 F.
11. Scones— Roll to 1-2 inch thickness. Cut in triangles or squares. Cook on a hot griddle. When one side is brown, turn.
12. Apple Biscuits— Substitute 3-4 cup smooth apple sauce for milk.
13. Health Biscuits— 1/2 cup butter, 1-2 cup sugar, 2 eggs, 1-2 teaspoon nutmeg, 1-2 teaspoon vanilla extract, 1-2 cups small toasted bread crumbs, 2 cups corn flakes, 4 cups dried fruit (raisins, cranberries, etc.) over top and sprinkle with 1-2 cup sugar; cover with remaining cream mixture. Bake in moderate oven (375 degrees F.) about 35 minutes, or until rhubarb is done.
Yield: 8 servings (8 1-2-inch castles).

BOSTON CREAM PIE

In the top of a double boiler place 1-2 cups evaporated milk and 1/2 cup water, and bring to a boil. In a large bowl mix thoroughly 3-4 cup sugar, 4 tablespoons flour, 1-4 teaspoon salt, 2 egg-yolks and 1 whole egg. When well blended pour the hot milk slowly over the egg mixture. Return to double boiler and cook until thickened, stirring constantly. Continue cooking for 4 minutes. Add 1 dessertspoon butter, cool, add 1 teaspoon vanilla and pour into baked pastry shell. Top with meringue, made from the egg whites, egg-white, and 4 tablespoons sugar. Bake in slow oven for 15 minutes.

These Plant Food Don'ts Keep You Out of Trouble

Recent years have brought forth a development, that of complete balanced plant food, which has brought success, in no small way to gardening. This product, being so different from the various miscellaneous materials formerly used, attention should be given to the proper methods for using, in order that the full benefit may be derived.

Manufacturers of plant food ordinarily supply with each package complete instructions as to how it should be used. The first essential in the use of a complete plant food is to make an even distribution, otherwise, just as in the case of sowing seed, you will have an uneven and spotted growth. Next keep in mind that the excessive use of plant food should be avoided. It is wasteful and may result in at least temporary injury from over-feeding. Many have found their best results come from frequent feeding of small quantities, rather than a few points to keep in mind:

Never apply plant food when grass is wet.

Do not put the product on the leaves or stalks of flowers or vegetables, or in direct contact with seeds or the roots of plants.

Where water is available sprinkle the grass thoroughly after application is made.

If water is not available run the back of a rake, doormat, or something similar over the lawn to knock the plant food off the grass.

This may also be done by sweep-

ing with a broom.
