AN IMPORTANT SUIT BROUGHT BY A WIDELY KNOWN BRITISH COLUMBIA FINANCIAL FIRM.

Shipping will commence in about two weeks. Considerable loss was entailed last year by early shipments owing to the potatoes being green and spoiling, one concern losing \$2,000 on one shipment. The crop will average about the same as last year.

- (5) All exhibits, except potted plants must be grown by the Exhibitor and no Exhibitor shall be eligible for more than one award in each class. Potted plants must be owned at least one month previously by the Exhibitor.
- (6) All exhibits must be placed in Show room before 11 a. m. August 28th, except from the West, when they must be placed immediately after the arrival of the noon train.
- (7) Exhibitors may enter any number of exhibits in any class, provided they are entered under the same number, but only one of such number shall be eligible for an award.
- (8) Class cards, corresponding to the entries, will be furnished to the exhibitors by the Secretary, and they will be responsible for the proper placing of the cards on their exhibits.
- (9) The decision of the judges shall be final.
