

ROTARY CLUB.—Rotarian Harold Jenkins presided over a large attendance at the weekly luncheon in the Davies Hotel yesterday. Premier Arsenault, Mr. J. O. Hyndman and His Worship Mayor Wright gave addresses on the proposed new aviation company and asked the Rotary Club to get behind the movement. They pointed out that this Province lay in the direct line of the proposed All Red Route from London to Vancouver and would form an ideal stopping off place. Prince Edward Island should be in the forefront of this movement just as she had been in the case of Confederation. The members enthusiastically applauded the speakers and there can be no doubt Rotary will back the company to the last dollar. Rotarian McAllister, Halifax gave a short address and complimented Charlottetown on its progressiveness. They were doing much more in the way of developing aviation than they evidently were in the States. A pleasing feature of the luncheon was the distribution of Santa Claus gifts, each member receiving a toy contributed by the members as a whole. Rotarian Chandler who leaves this morning to visit his wounded son in England received numerous gifts as reminders of his association with Charlottetown Rotarians while he is rotating on the S. S. Olympic and elsewhere. Rotarian Gallagher contributed a delightful solo accompanied on the piano by Mr. F. T. Watkins.
