TORONTO TELEGRAM'S special cable: London, Aug. 14.—Henceforth the command of the Canadian militia is to be given to a capable officer closely connected with the Dominion, and this virtually means that Gen. O'Grady-Haly's successor will be a Canadian officer. In some circles in Canada considerable agitation over the appointment of an officer of the Dominion forces to the chief position in the militia has taken place.

JAMES A. WADELL and John F. Whear of Charlottetown, who have been attending the convention of the Oddfellows in Moncton, are in the city. Mr. Waddell is superintendent of the Royal Electric Co. of Charlottetown, and to a Star reporter this morning said that the amalgamation of the Royal, the Full Electric Co. and Charlottetown Light and Power Co. has been completed with the exception of a few minor details which will be settled at the meeting to be held in a few days.—St. John Star.

Recently on his ninety-first birthday, the Rev. John Spurgeon, father of the eminent Baptist preachers who have predeceased him, laid the foundation stone of an extension of the South Norwood Baptist church and made a long speech.

At a meeting of the Dominion Educational Association Prof. Robertson of the Department of Agriculture in the course of his address emphasized the necessity of action as opposed to talk. "The education given in the country districts did not suit the people. Nature should come first and books afterwards. School gardens were good things. He suggested consolidated schools, where there were weak districts, which would cost no more, and could maintain a teacher of some ability. Experimental schools, short courses, and continuation schools were other suggestions. Prof. Robertson suggested a committee which would put this question of the rural school house to the test for two years or three years and make a veiled hint that the government would aid the same financially."

REPORTS from different parts of the province state that P. E. Island can be depended upon for very few apples. In dealing with the matter an exchange remarks, that the fruit growers of the country as a class may take some comfort in the reports now current with regard to the outlook for the apple crop. Those farmers who will have no apples at all will, of course, have reason to be somewhat despondent; but in sections where the crop is simply not up to the average it will probably be found when the season is over that the gain in price will more than compensate for decreased quantities. The prices obtained during the last two seasons have not been good; indeed, some shipments failed to bring anything at all, and were simply a dead loss, all on account of the abundance of fruit. This year the crop everywhere will be short.

THOMAS MANNING, Esq., a lumber merchant of Bridgeport, Barbados, is spending a six month's holiday with friends in Canada. He was in Halifax last week, and is now visiting at Charlottetown P. E. I. Mr. Manning handles quite a large quantity of Canadian lumber every year, but buys principally through Barbados commission houses. He expressed a desire that more trade might be done between Barbados and Canada. Mr. Manning expressed surprise that more Canadians have not visited the British West Indies. He thinks that if they did there would be an increase in trade. He said he felt sure that anyone who took passage by the "Orinoco," the boat by which he came up, would have no complaints to make regarding the lack of accommodation or attention. Everything was just as nice as it could be and the expense very reasonable indeed.—Maritime Merchant.
