NEW YORK, April 28-(AP)-
Leading stocks shook off pessimistic
news items in today's market
and posted recoveries of fractions
to more than a point.
Most Canadian issues were firm,
some showing slight gains. Bell Tel
phone was up 1-2, Imperial Oil and
Lake Shore 1-8 and International
Nickel 1-4. Walkers closed 1-4 off.
The Associated Press average of
80 stocks was up 1/4 of a point at
39.5. Volume dropped sharply on
the revival, however, transfers of
310,810 shares being the smallest
for a full session since March 5.
Trade was up with 424,900 Friday.
Prominent stocks on the upside
were U.S. Steel, Bethlehem, Doug-
las Aircraft, Sperry, Curtiss-Wright
"A", Bendix, Air Reduction, Union
Carbide, General Steel Castings
Preferred, Loft, Santa Fe, Central
Coast Line, Montgomery Ward and
Consolidated Edison.
Chrysler was unchanged and
General Motors down 1-8. Others in
rears were Standard Oil of N.J.,
Goodyear, Woolworth, N.Y. Central,
Allied Chemical, Kennecott and
Johns-Manville.

Declines, liberally spread through-
out the list, showed under the few
additions that popped up here and
there on the stock market today.
Construction was on the down-
grade with Asbestos off a point and
General Steel Wares and Dominion
Bridge each 1-4 lower. Canada Ce-
ment dipped the minimum amount
but the preferred issue, in light
turnover, added 1-2.
In utilities and metals, Bell Tele-
phone lost 1 1-2 and Noranda back-
ed a point while Montreal Power,
Hudson Bay and Hollinger were
shaded 1-4 apiece. Brazilian gained
1-4 and other traders in these sec-
tions were even.
National Steel Car backtracked a
point in rails and C.P.R. lost 1-4
while Canadian Car backed on 1-8.
International Petroleum closed up
1-2 and Canada Steamships and
Seagrams added 1-8.
Total sales: 9,500 shares; Indus-
trial 7,000; Mines, 2,500; Bonds,
\$700.

SOMETIMES it is good for a
nation, as for an individual, to
take stock of itself. To add up the
good things it has gained, and how
they may be preserved...

For many years we in Canada
have taken our personal freedom
for granted. Perhaps too much for granted.
Now our liberties are once again threatened.
Every day we see all too vivid pictures of the
suffering which military power and complacency
together have brought to men and women very
like ourselves.

And just because complacency itself is a
danger, I want to make you stop and ask your-
self a question. It is this: why was it that back
before freedom was taken for granted, people
were prepared to fight, and if need be to die, for
the freedom of the press?

Why is the very price of liberty bound up in
the right and the duty of your newspaper to
bring you all the facts about all that happens?
Why is the freedom of the press the first
thing a would-be dictatorship challenges in its
climb to power? What can YOU do to guard
the freedom of the press here in Canada?
It's really very simple...

a story, and they'll come to believe that side!

consistent with a strictly military censorship.

little more thoroughly.

go back to the homespun sport your grand-
father loved... argue with your neighbour about
it. Don't ever just say, "I'll let George worry
about that one"... in a democracy George is you!

Whenever you notice a mis-statement...
more important, whenever you think you smell
a story that's only half told, squawk about it.
Telephone, write a letter to the editor... what-
ever you like. But do something!

Above all, unless you're tired of being about
the freest men and women in the world,
don't take the freedom of the press for granted!
