IS CONFIDENT OF FUTURE OF CANADA

MONTREAL Jan 15—Discussing the business outlook for Canada today at a meeting of shareholders of the Royal Bank, Sir Herbert Holt, the president, said the most unfavorable feature was the unsettled European situation.

However, he said, there was reason to look forward in Canada with a great degree of confidence, based upon the prospects that the present industrial activity will continue during 1923, that exports will improve, that there is no surplus of goods on the shelves to cause a reaction, and that the banking situation was secure, in fact had probably never been better.

In submitting the financial report to the Council, Mr. Moran referred to the Finance Committee as being highly satisfactory and complimented Collector Vandierstine and Mr. Collector also the policemen who collected taxes. All the sinking funds are now on a good basis and the committee is endeavoring to keep up premiums promptly. Practically every outstanding bill had been paid with the exception of the coal bill which had not been submitted. There was a very satisfactory increase in the dock-tax this year to which credit was due Officer Bracey.

The report on motion of Council was adopted as read after being favorably commented upon. Health Officer, Dr. McMILLAN, his health report for the year said the city had established a highly satisfactory health record. Only two typhoid cases were reported, there being no deaths from contagious diseases. There were twelve tuberculosis deaths, a falling off from last year. The cancer deaths were seventeen, an increase of one. The death rate among young children was less, which was attributable in no small measure to the excellent work done by the meat and milk inspectors, Dr. C. Croken. The sanitary work of Sgt. Brady had been very diligent but there are still difficulties to contend with in regard to back yards and water closets. There are also still many complaints coming in about pigs being kept in the city and this practice should be abolished. A detailed statement of deaths in the city, which numbered 233 as compared with 223 the previous year was given.

Cora Rattray, chairman of the Street Committee then submitted her report which was also highly commended upon. He gave a full statement of the work done which included snow plough and street

with the Main Well on Malpeque Road were replaced with 12 inch cast iron pipe. This portion of the line is now perfectly tight, but the Commissioners would recommend that the remainder of the vitrified line be changed to cast iron at the earliest possible date. Main water and sewer extensions were laid on the following streets: Victoria street, 300 feet of 6 inch sewer and 525 feet of 4 inch water pipe; York street and Park Terrace, 300 feet of 4 inch water pipe; Bishop street, 358 feet, of 6 inch sewer pipe; Brighton Avenue, 60 feet of 6 inch sewer pipe.

Two (2) additional wells were drilled at the auxiliary supply system bringing the total number of wells on this system to thirty-six (36).

To meet the expenditure for construction work it was necessary to issue eight thousand (\$8,000) dollars in 5% water debentures and two thousand five hundred (\$2,500) dollars in sewer debentures all of which sold locally at par.

The balance in the Bank of Nova Scotia in favor of Water Construction account is \$327.57. In favor of Sewerage Construction account, \$45.00, and in favor of House Connections account \$154.46.

Seventy-one (71) buildings were connected with sewerage, the largest number of sewer connections laid in any one year since the system was installed.

Forty-five (45) buildings, principally new houses were connected with water.

On all streets where concrete sidewalks were being laid the water gate boxes were moved outside the line of the new walk. All worn-out boxes and curb cocks were replaced by new ones.

Five hundred and fifty (550) orders were issued by the office during the year for turning on and off water.

At the close of the year there are 2,606 dwellings, stores, etc., using water supplied by this Department.

1,790 of the water takers, or about 69%, are connected with the sewerage system.

The sum of \$38,655.89 was collected in water rates during the year as compared with \$35,459.97 collected in 1921. The revenue this year has been the largest in our history and is shown by the following comparative statement:

There was a decrease in the total operating expenses over 1921 of one hundred and five dollars and thirty-three cents (\$105.33). The surplus paid to the City Council to be used toward paying water and sewer interest and sinking fund charges was \$12,619.75, an increase of \$3,042.25 over the previous year.

The pumping records show 435,000 gallons of water pumped during the year, 143,000,000 gallons being from the North River wells.

The average daily pumping for the year was 1,191,800 or about 100 gallons per head per day for the 12,000 people supplied. The per capita consumption last year was 106 gallons.

The total number of water services now laid is 2,713 and the total number of buildings connected with sewerage is 1,523, but in many buildings one sewer connection serves a number of water takers.

Hydrants, valves, sewers, etc., have been carefully tested and flushed periodically during the year. No serious breaks have occurred and with less water pumped, decreased operating expenses, increased revenue, larger surplus and a more efficient plant than in
