BIOGRAPHICAL

The Rev. Roderick MacLean, the subject of the foregoing poem was well and favorably known in different parts of this province especially among the Gaelic speaking congregations of the Presbyterian Church.

He was born in the Highlands of Scotland, of humble parentage in the year 1855. He received his early education in the public schools of his native land. When a mere youth he decided to prepare himself for the ministry. By sheer determination and tenacity of purpose he accomplished the goal of his ambition, earning his way through college by fishing, seamanship or any other work that offered during his vacation. He graduated from Edinburgh University in the summer of 1885.

Having crossed the Atlantic he was advised by friends to come to P. E. Island. His first attention was directed towards the Valleyfield congregation which was vacant at that time. He first preached there in the summer of 1885, and so pleased were the people with his presentation of the Gospel that a unanimous call was extended to him by this congregation which he accepted and was ordained and inducted as their pastor the same fall.

He is physically a very powerful man, and his eloquence both in Gaelic and English together with his sincerity, his strong personality, his well founded convictions and his fearless manner of reproving sin of every kind soon gained for him a warm place in the hearts of his hearers.

During the fall and winter of '85 and '86, a wave of religious revival broke out first in Valleyfield and afterwards spread out to the neighboring congregations of Cardigan, Wood Islands, Orwell and Brookfield.

During his first year and a half as minister of Valleyfield congregation one hundred and seventy-six adults were received into the church through the Sacrament of Baptism. A very large number of children were also baptized. In many cases whole families, father, mother and children were baptized together.

The first time the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was dispensed in the congregation under his ministrations, two hundred and sixty-two people, a token for the first time and their names were added to the church roll.

The services of the communion season from the first start of the congregation were conducted in both Gaelic and English. On Sabbath day one service would be held in the church and the other conducted in the open air with the minister preaching from a small booth erected for the purpose.

The necessity of having a building in which to hold the last named service strongly appealed to Mr. MacLean. No sooner was the need known than the people took hold of the proposition and immediately set to work to carry out this purpose. A building seventy feet by seventy was soon erected. This structure was built after the style of the modern rink and had a seating capacity of upwards of twelve hundred people. The debt incurred in this undertaking was wiped out the first year.

On Communion Sabbath both the tent and church, which also had a seating capacity of upward of five hundred people, would be crowded to the doors.

In proof of the religious enthusiasm obtaining in the congregation in those days prayer meeting held two nights a week so well attended that the seating capacity of the church was often taxed to its utmost.

Each annual Communion season added its quota to the communion roll. The last year of Mr. MacLean's pastorate showed an addition of fifty-two to the communion roll. On July 1906, Mr. MacLean tendered his resignation, having accepted a call to the congregation of Hampton, Quebec. He laboured with great acceptance in this last charge. He died of cancer, on Jan. 27th, 1908, being 53 years of age.

The foregoing verses were composed by one of his flock in this last named congregation. The poem was translated into English by the Rev.

And now I pray the King above That He may send us in his love A guide whose eyes the Anointing have Whose hand can lead and succor us.

But now I must conclude my lay, I'll see thee not till the last day O! for grace I humbly pray To lead me safely heavenward.

The above verses were composed shortly after the death of the Rev. Roderick MacLean, and the author would hereby apologize for the crude composition. Nevertheless the motive which promoted the author is pure.

The memory of the late Mr. MacLean will be green and fresh in Hampton during the lifetime of those who sat under his ministrations. JOHN MORRISON, Hampton.
