

Rangers And Canadiens Turn In Great Hockey

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Que., Dec. 20.—The 2-2 tie between New York Rangers and Les Canadiens here Saturday night provided a well-filled house with a hockey game which for sheer speed and scintillating action has not been equalled here during the present National Hockey League season. The Canadiens twice came from behind to effect a deadlock which an overtime session failed to break.

All four goals were scored with precision and polish, the first period brought two goals and the second was productive of two more. The third period and overtime session were scoreless.

The Rangers drew first blood in the opening period, Somers' pass came just at the right time and Dillon slammed the puck cleanly into the cage. A minute later Albert Leduc started a rush from the Canadiens' defence. He passed to Armando Mondou as he met the Ranger's defence. Mondou passed back to Leduc as Johnson and Selbert dove at him and Leduc scored from close in.

The Rangers made it 2-1 in the next period. Selbert, their new defence sensation who played a smart game throughout, made the scoring play. With a great show of speed for so big a fellow, he charged down the ice, swung around the defence and passed out from behind the goal cage to Bun Cook, who batted the puck into the net as Hainsworth tried to cover the corner. The Canadiens came right back two minutes later with a beautiful scoring play that tied up the score again at 2-2. Mondou darted down the ice with Larochelle and Lepine on each side. He passed across to Larochelle inside the blue line and Larochelle

FALCONS AND TIRED LEAFS AMERKS TIE LOSE TO CHI.

(Canadian Press) NEW YORK, N. Y., Dec. 20.—Trailing 2 to 0 at the end of the second period of a dull National Hockey League game, the Detroit Falcons came back, in the third frame tonight, to earn a 2-2 tie with the New York Americans. The draft left the Amerks tied with the Montreal Canadiens for the Canadian division lead.

The Americans had all the better of the first two frames. Normie Himes broke away from a Falcon attack in the first when Rabbit McVeigh was in the penalty box and scored the first goal. In the second Himes snared a loose puck and passed to McVeigh for another goal.

The Falcons broke away from the slow-motion play in the third period to score twice.

Larry Aurie sank a carom shot that made its way through a group of players in front of the net. A three-man play brought the tying goal, Eddie Goodfellow scoring on passes from Reg Noble and Herbie Lewis.

The Leafs gave the Hawks plenty of trouble all the way, but their hard battle against the Montreal Maroons Saturday night appeared to have slowed them up, and with only 50 seconds to go in the overtime period, "Mush" March took a pass from Tommy Cook and slapped the puck into the net.

The contest was ragged most of the way, and open shots at the cages were few.

On numerous trips last week Pilot Fowler was forced to ask a number of his passengers to "nurse" others on their respective knees during the trip over. This means of travel is becoming more popular every day—and if the rush continues, it looks as if another plane will be called into operation.

"STAY ON THE ICE"
One of the most valuable players on a hockey lineup, is one who remains on the ice throughout his allotted time—it may be for a period of three or four minutes at a time, but if said hockeyist spends half that time in the hoosegow, then he is better off the ice altogether.

A glaring example of the above is Bill Gill and Burrage, Moncton defencemen, who together did 73 minutes in the pen during the pre-season series. The Moncton Hawks as a whole, wasted 114 minutes off the ice. Penalties are imposed to curb, and sometimes check ambiguous hockeyists, but when said puckmen persist in drawing penalty awards, then they are a detriment to a team rather than an asset. It is an old hockey saying—and a true one, "Hockey games are won on the ice and not in the penalty box."

THE MONCTON-ABBIE GAME
The following are a few sidelights on the recent game at Moncton:

READ 'EM
Abbies Surprised Hawks
"Moncton Hawks seemed surprised with the suddenness and effectiveness of a lashing Abbie attack as the first period swung into action. Burrage drew a penalty for clipping Gross hard as he stepped inside the blue line and his absence was a signal for the visitors to throw their full weight into the attack. Kane, the former Hamilton Tiger star, played great hockey for the Abbies, came through alone, stick handled right through the defence and drew Foster to one corner of the net as he poked the rubber into the opposite corner."

STULL GREAT
"Moncton sprang to the attack and cornered the Abegweits in their own end of the rink. Gill, who did a large share of rushing this period, led an assault on the Abbies oge in a combination play with Muckie, and the latter drew the defence nicely as he slipped the rubber over to Gill. The big defence man coasted right in on Stull who made a great save. How?—only Mr. Stull can explain."

NOT BREAKS—PENALTIES
"The "breaks" came via penalties to the Hawks.
When Burrage was penalized for dumping Gross, Kane rode through his vacant side of the rink for the first goal. He had just returned to play when the second one was scored. Gill was serving time when Doucett took Oliver's pass for the third goal, and again Gill was with the timers when Kane raced in for the final counter."

"KANE OUTSTANDING"
"Hurry" Kane was outstanding for the visitors with Schwab and Doucette also strong. Stull was good and the other: played smart hockey all the way. Their showing was a complete surprise to a majority of the fans who were impressed

with their dashing ability in that first period. It was during this session they were seen at their best."

Good Hockey
"With five minutes to go the Hawks were fighting like mad for a score and the Abbies were just as determined to stave them off. Long shots up the ice whenever an Islander could get the rubber was the order of the day. It brought boos from the Moncton fans, but it was good hockey under the circumstances."

Fast Work
"Something like forty seconds later and just as Burrage returned to the ice, Gross came down straight and shot from outside the defence, Foster took it on his pads and the rubber rebounded to Doucett who took another shot. Ester handled this too and fell flat to smother the play as the Abbies swarmed in. The puck, however, rolled out from under him and Gross, who was waiting uncovered. The rangy defence man flicked it into an empty goal."

Clean Work By Abbies
"Moncton forced the play in the third session and they fought like demons for a score, but the Abbies threw up a barrier that defied penetration. Blocking and clearing and occasionally slamming in a stiff body check, the Abbies' defence played great hockey when they got underway. Red Cook was h's usual brilliant self, but he was a marked man. Foster turned in a fine performance too, but he was given no chance to prevent the goals which were scored on him. They were all cleverly executed plays by the Abbies."

Hawks Claimed Goal
"Connolly raced up centre as he broke away from the Abegweits who held the play pretty much in Moncton territory, and as he struck the defence blazed a low, ankle high shot at Stull. Fans in the far end of the rink where Stull was guarding, raised a mighty roar, but play continued until Coach Nicklin drew the referee's attention. The Moncton players claimed a goal. They said Connolly's shot went in the net and came out, and fans in that end of the rink were of the same opinion, but from the press box it may or may not have. It either struck the inside post, or the outside post. There was considerable of an argument and the goal judge in that end of the rink was removed. Another went in his place and play was resumed."

Fighting Finish Trims Maroons

Toronto Maple Leafs Stage Third Period Rally To Turn Back Montreal 4-2.

(Canadian Press) TORONTO, Ont., Dec. 20.—A third period scoring punch that netted two goals gave the Toronto Maple Leafs a 4 to 2 victory over Montreal Maroons in a National Hockey League game played here Saturday night. It was the second time in two weeks the Leafs have vanquished their Montreal opponents and incidentally the last game lost by the Leafs was at the hands of the Maroons on Dec. 3.

The teams battled through three quarters of the first period without a score; then Jimmy Ward came down the right boards unmolesed and let loose a hard drive after he crossed the blue line that hit the corner of the net. Chabot did not get a clear sight on the shot and was easily beaten. That ended the scoring in the first period though both teams came close on numerous occasions.

Three goals were scored in the last six minutes of the second session. Darragh scored the tying goal on Joe Primeau's pass and four minutes later Primeau furnished Jackson with another pass which the left winger converted into the Leafs' second goal. The Leafs' lead was short-lived for within 35 seconds Nels Stewart tied it up again on a combination play with Hooley Smith and Siebert.

Charlie Conacher sent them into the lead, Primeau again making the play and furnishing a perfect pass. Taking advantage of a penalty to McVicar, Finnigan and Jackson combined to clinch the game for the Leafs, the former drawing the defence out of position, then slipping the puck to Jackson who had an easy time scoring. In the last few minutes Bailey and Horner drew penalties, the former a major for

slashing Trotter, but great work by Andy Blair in holding on to the puck saved the Leafs until Trotter was banished to reduce the manpower advantage to one.
