SMELT FISHERMEN

A despatch from Providence, R. I., under the date of December sixteenth contains the following information which will be of interest to fishers of shell fish in this province: Professor F. P. Gorham of Brown University, expert adviser of the Rhode Island Shellfish Commission declared last evening, in an address delivered before the Sigma Xi Society at Rhode Island Hall, that there had never been a single case of disease in the city of Providence which could be traced to the eating of shellfish. Professor Gorham further stated that the only case on record in this country in which disease could be traced to such a source, was one which occurred in Middletown, Conn., in October, 1894. The lecture was on "Sanitary Oysters," and in its course the speaker took occasion to explain the many improvements which have been made in the oyster beds of Narragansett Bay. Professor Gorham said that, in his opinion, the question of disease being carried by the oyster was one which had received altogether too much consideration. He declared that he did not believe it possible for typhoid fever, germs, which are emitted by the sewers, to live long enough in salt water to reach the beds in which the oysters are grown at present. That the oyster will take in the germ as food if the beds be placed in close proximity to a sewer, the speaker said, there was no doubt, but with the care that is now being used in the placing of beds there is very little danger.

WINNIPEG, Mann., Dec. 19.—Federal agents, the Russian refugee, who was re-arrested after Justice Robson annulled the extradition on Saturday was this morning released from custody, the second charge of attempting to kill a Russian Constable being dropped.

BERLIN, Dec. 19.—Twenty German army officers headed by a major will be selected from a number that have volunteered to go to Brazil and give military instructions to the Brazilian army. The officers thus delegated will resign the commissions they now hold at home. Brazil requested the service of German officers as a result of popular discontent with the present training

ENGLISH CLERGYMAN FOR WESTERN CANADA.

LONDON, December 19.—The acting secretary of the society for the propagation of the gospel announces that twenty unmarried clergymen have been deputed to Western Canada. The society's portion of the archbishops' fund allocated to Rupert's land is £500; Calgary, £1500; Qu'Appelle, £1750; Saskatchewan \$600.

ROCKEFELLER'S GENEROSITY.

CHICAGO, Dec. 21.—Mr. Rockefeller completed the task he set for himself in founding the University of Chicago. Public announcement was made of a "single and final gift" of \$20,000,000 which included all contributions that Rockefeller had planned to make to the University. This sum will make a total of \$35,000,000 that Mr. Rockefeller has donated to the University.

The recent thaw in many instances gave an effective demonstration of the value of properly made and graded streets. Anywhere throughout the city where the streets have been fixed up recently the grading was sufficient to allow the water, resulting from the effect of the sun on the snow, to flow in the gutter, while the remainder of the street was comparatively dry. Earlier in the autumn, when the hard frost of days had hardened the streets, the old streets which were suffering from a lack of attention gave drivers endless trouble with their horses and carriages by reason of the decidedly roughened surface caused by water and mud lodging on the improperly graded streets. Those streets which received proper attention were almost better than ever after the frost. As an example of the former, one might cite Upper Queen Street, which is badly in need of fixing up. And there are others. Generally speaking, the streets of Charlottetown are good, but much above the average for cities of its size elsewhere—and are becoming better each year as the street committee effects much needed improvements here and there. But Queen Street, especially Upper Queen, is much in need of repairs and it can be confidently expected that early next season the street committee will see their way clear to effect the improvements necessary on this thoroughfare, which are justified both by the amount of traffic on it and its present condition.

PAPER SPINNING.

It has been said that manufacturers can now spin anything but sand. It is certainly a wonder how the most fragile threads are woven into fabrics. It is well known that wool, silk, hemp, linen and cotton are the principal fibres that are spun and woven together. The Germans now

"ennoble," as they say, common cellulose or paper pulp which really has no fibre in it and make it into fabrics. As far back as 1887 the Germans took out a patent for spinning paper, and other methods have followed and now paper spun into threads and woven is used under the names of "Jacella," "Stivalin," and "Xylolla." One of the principal places of manufacture is near Mannheim. Here the raw material is first treated chemically and gives a strength and elasticity quite surprising. It is then put through dyeing or bleaching processes as may be desired. From it are made tents, hats, bags and carpets. It has no odor and is made at a cost of one-third that of cotton and one-tenth that of flax. Shoes and slippers are made of this material and they sell at the ridiculously low price of 25 cents for a dozen pairs. A whole suit of clothes can be supplied for one dollar. By treatment with gelatine the material is said to be damp proof and, most wonderful of all washable.
