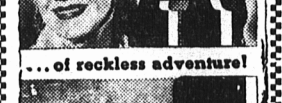

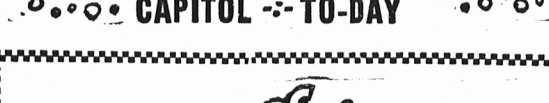

NAVAL DRAFT ENTERTAINMENT - A Royal Canadian Naval Volunteer Reserve draft was conducted last night on board the H.M.C.S. "Queen Charlotte" by the Canadian Legion, Charlottetown Branch. STARCH FACTORIES OPEN - The four starch factories in the province opened their doors to the potato growers of the province this year and already a fair number of tubers have been delivered to the plants. They are situated at Hunter River, St. Peter's, East Public and Murray Harbour. Farmers are receiving 65 cents a hundredweight for field run mountains showing scab, 60 cents for cobbler of a like quality, 60 cents for small potatoes and slightly less for culls.

CARS FERRIED DECREASE - A decrease of 2,380 cars ferried between Borden and Tormentine in August this year is shown by comparison with August 1941 figures. From Toronto to Borden there is a decrease of 2,291. Leaving the province during the month were 1,182 autos and entering there were 1,117. The net decrease in the number of cars ferried between the two points is partly due to the gasoline and the restrictions in effect from Toronto to Borden during the last month amounted to 127 cars, which was an increase of 63 cars over August. This total included: Flour and feed, 163 cars; railway coal, 111 cars; Miscellaneous, 318 cars; coal, 30 cars; From Borden to Tormentine, the cars of freight were carried in August 1942, which was an increase of 36 cars over the same month last year. These included: Potatoes, 127 cars; turpins, 44 cars; less than carloads, 102 cars; livestock, 109 cars; miscellaneous, 159 cars.

DEHYDRATION PLANT ALMOST CERTAIN - A dehydration plant in Charlottetown is practically assured, it was announced last night by L. C. G. E. Full. He said that those interested were promised that the machinery for such a plant would be available for this town by August 1st. The plant will be organized and commenced by the first of January. In connection with the proposed dehydration plant Mr. Full, Dehydration Expert with the Dominion Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, will arrive in Charlottetown Saturday and meet to discuss plans with the following: Messrs. A. A. Scates, Freetown; E. C. McLean, Souris; A. B. Fisher, Charlottetown; L. R. Allen, Summerside; L. C. G. E. Full, Charlottetown; Hon. H. H. Cox, Moncton; and R. G. Clark, M.L.A. - Mt. Stewart. The scheme has been promoted by the Associated Shippers.

Dr. J.R. Mott To Visit Here

A representative group of Protestant clergymen and laymen met in Trinity Hall Church here yesterday evening to discuss plans for the forthcoming visit to Charlottetown of Dr. John R. Mott, outstanding United States Presbyterian statesman and religious leader. He will arrive in the city October 27 and will attend a number of meetings the following day when he will meet with the various churches of the Protestant churches of this province.

Accompanying Dr. Mott will be the following: Foreign Mission Secretaries of the Canadian Churches: Anglican, Canon L. A. Dixon, Secretary of the Missionary Society of the Church of England, Toronto; Dr. J. B. McLaughlin, Secretary of the Canadian Baptist Foreign Missionary Board, Toronto; Dr. W. A. Cameron, Secretary of the Board of Missions of the United Church, also of Toronto.

Dr. Mott will include other Maritime centres in his tour which is under the auspices of the Foreign Missionary Board. The object of the conference is to bring together representatives of all the churches to review the situation of the Canadian churches as facing both overseas and at home.

Dr. John R. Mott

In a brief biographical sketch of Dr. Mott, the chairman last night said he was recognized throughout the world as the outstanding missionary statesman and religious leader of our day.

Under appointment by President Woodrow Wilson, Dr. Mott served as the first and only Secretary of the Y.M.C.A. in the United States and in the Orient. He has received numerous honorary degrees and decorations from Universities and Governments of no less than 12 different countries in the Occident and in the Orient.

"From the time of his graduation at Cornell he had devoted himself to the study and promotion of movements of world-wide concern," Dr. Miller said. For the first 30 years of his existence, Dr. Mott was chairman of the Y.M.C.A. in the United States and in the Orient. He was founder and for the first 30 years, the leader of the World Student Christian Federation. As the Executive of the Foreign Division of the Y.M.C.A. as general Secretary of its National Council, and as President of the World Alliance of the Y.M.C.A., he rendered a service of importance in the world of service. Until his resignation a few months ago, Dr. Mott was chairman of the International Y.M.C.A. Council for about 32 years. This Council unites all Protestant Missionary Societies of the world as well as the rising native churches of Asia, Africa, and Latin America. He is Vice-President of the World Council of Churches.

In addition to his many important posts, Dr. Mott has had time to write 13 books and has travelled extensively during the past six years.

More Than \$6,000 Realized In Drive

Despite the fact that yesterday was a half-holiday for the majority of the business firms in the city, canvassers succeeded in turning in another \$2,000 for the joint M.C.G. Salvation Army campaign for funds. The amount for the day was announced when the returns were presented at a supper meeting of workers held in the "Y" last evening.

On the first day of the drive more than \$4,000 was realized in a canvass of the city. This brings the total up to \$6,000 or more. The provincial objective is \$13,000 and the outlying districts are expected to contribute a substantial amount to it.

Army Course At University

Particulars of No. 1 Canadian Army Course, University of Toronto, have been announced by Major J. B. Paton, M.C., representing Brigadier W.W. Foster, D.S.O., V.D., District Officer, Commanding, Military District No. 6.

A special one-year course in the fundamentals of mathematics, physics and engineering will be conducted by the University of Toronto commencing October 10, 1942. This course will be open to selected candidates possessing the necessary educational qualifications within the ages of 17-19 years, both inclusive.

All candidates must have Grade XII (Upper School or Senior Matriculation), or Grade XII of British Columbia, or Grade XII of other Provinces. Preference will be given to those who have obtained good standing in the subjects, algebra, geometry, trigonometry and physics at the above examinations. Applications should be made at once by mail, telephone or telegram to Professor E.F. Burton, Head of the Department of Physics, University of Toronto. Successful candidates will be enlisted into the Canadian Army (Active) under the following conditions: (a) Enlistments will only be permitted from the age of seventeen years up to the age of 25 years. (b) The written consent of parents must be given in the case of all boys under eighteen.

(c) Until a boy reaches the age of eighteen years he will receive wages of eight pence a day after boys' pay (70 cents a day) after which he will go on standard rates of pay (\$1.30 a day). (d) Boys eighteen years of age and over will receive standard rates of pay upon enlistment.
