**ISLAND WOMAN IS KILLED BY AUTO**

Mrs. Clifford Angus Knocked Down Near Home; Dies Before Reaching Hospital.

Mrs. Clifford Angus, 65 years old, and a resident of Vancouver for 22 years, was struck and almost instantly killed by an automobile driven by Miss Alivazoff in the 1000 block Davie Street at 5.55 p.m. yesterday. The accident occurred at dusk, but prior to last night's heavy fog, says a Vancouver exchange.

Mrs. Angus lived at 1035 Davie Street and was returning home after taking some food to a sick neighbor who lived across the street. She had passed in front of a street car going west on Davie Street when she was proceeding parallel to the street car. Mr. Alivazoff, who was driving to his home in 1108 Nicola Street, carried the dying woman to St. Paul's Hospital, which is but a few blocks away, but death occurred just as she was being admitted to the institution.

Mr. Alivazoff, who is a member of the firm of Alivazoff & Penko Co., Ltd., manufacturing agents, immediately notified the police and gave himself up. He was formerly charged with manslaughter and released on \$5,000 bail.

Mrs. Angus' body was taken to the city morgue where an inquest will be held.

**A Pioneer of City**

Mrs. Angus was born in Prince Edward Island and was the daughter of Peter McKinnon. Her husband, Clifford Angus, is a caulker, formerly in the employ of Wallace Shipyards. He is a member of the Pioneer's Association and Mrs. Angus had planned to join the organization at the next meeting. She is survived by three daughters: Mrs. W. Murphy, 1173 Richards Street, and Mrs. R. A. Stony and Emma Angus live at the family residence. She has two sons, Odean, who lives at home, and Walter, resident in Portland.

No arrangements have yet been made for the funeral.

**LUNAR PHOTOGRAPHS.**

A recent report of the moon section of the British Astronomical Association dwells upon the many additions that have been made to the map of the moon by recent photographs taken with the great 100-inch reflector at Mount Wilson, and suggests that a complete photographic atlas of the moon made by the same instrument would be a magnificent achievement. For example, one of the Mt. Wilson photographs depicts the whole of the Mare Imbrium. A rough count of the craters and craterlets shown in this region gives a total of more than 700, of which about 300 are not found on any existing maps. It would take an observer, using a powerful telescope, several years to detect and map all of these minute details, which have been recorded by the camera in less than two seconds.
