Leslie and Evans are the least concerned over the hubbub created by the impending meeting of the pair. They go quietly about their training chores; not a prediction is heard from them and the only thing that appears certain is that both will be in perfect condition for the bout.

With the fight still six days away both battlers are very close to the peak of their condition. Leslie, trained by Billie Holm, is getting stiff, gruelling workouts every day and the former champ is thriving on it all. Evans, while having no outstanding boxers to train with is nevertheless surrounded by a retinue of eager, willing helpers who each do their little bit in getting the champ in shape for the first defence of his crown.

Viewing the fight from all angles it looks to be a certainty that the scene of a close, exciting, and gruelling battle. ## Push Plans For Heavyweight Title Bout In Chicago Now Cleared Of Legal Obstacles

NEW YORK, June 10—(AP)—With the way apparently cleared of legal obstacles, preparations for the James J. Braddock-Joe Louis heavyweight title fight picked up momentum tonight.

The long-awaited decision on the plea of Madison Square Garden that Braddock be restrained from fighting the Bomber until the Champ first meets Max Schmeling, was handed down today by the Circuit Court of Appeals in Philadelphia and the verdict was another set-back for the Garden.

The Philadelphia Court refused to reverse the decision of Judge Guy L. Fike of New Jersey who previously had declined to grant the petition.

So unless the Garden can strike again—speedily and decisively—there appears nothing can stop Braddock and Louis from slugging away at each other in Comiskey Park, Chicago, on the night of June 22.

Just what the Garden's next step will be is uncertain. President John Reed Kilpatrick withheld comment.

The decision was handed along the other fronts. Told over the telephone he had won the decision, Braddock, in training at Grand Beach, Mich., said: "Now I will win one more to win and I have only that on June 22."

In Chicago, a beaming Joe Foley and a beaming Mike Jacobs, co-promoters of the forthcoming battle, redoubled their efforts and predicted set sales would take an immediate spurt.

"Lots of people were holding back until they heard the decision," Foley said the court's verdict breaks the hold New York has had on the Heavyweight Championship since the days of Tex Rickard. "It means Chicago has won the World's Heavyweight Championship from New York and will be in the picture from now on," he added.

## Red Sox And Senators In Player Deal

BOSTON, June 10—(AP)—Boston Red Sox and Washington Senators today appeared to strengthen their clubs, five days before the trading deadline, by exchanging their managers "problem children" in a deal that involved five players.

The Red Sox, in dire need of pitching strength turned over the Majors only brother battery, Wes and Rick Ferrell, along with outfielder Mel Almada, for pitcher Buck Newsum and outfielder Ben Chapman. General Manager Bob Collins of Red Sox, insisted no cash was involved in the deal.

The Boston Club regarded the acquisition of Newsum and Chapman as helpful and the Senators, who have been seeking a competent catcher for several seasons, were confident that Rick Ferrell would strengthen their outstanding weakness.

Neither of the pitchers involved in the deal, probably the most temperamental pair in baseball, can be depended upon to bolster either of those second division clubs.

Wes Ferrell, 29-year-old right-hander appears to have lost the control that earned him 20 victories against 15 defeats last season, and Newsum, another starboard fliker, who won 17 and lost 15 a year ago, has also had trouble getting started this year.

Ferrell's outbursts, which generally take the form of stalking off the mound without waiting for orders when the fire gets heavy, have aggravated Cronin and many of the Boston fans for the past two seasons. He drew a \$1,000 fine for such conduct a year ago but it was later rescinded.

Newsum's braggadocio has also been resented here although the Red Soxers admit that so far he had made good his boast that he would beat "Lefty" Grove, their southpaw ace, everytime he started against him.

## Cubs Defeat Dodgers To Close-in On Idle Giants; Yankees Halt Sox' Streak

NEW YORK, June 10—Billy Jurges and Augie Galan teed off on Brooklyn pitching today and paced Chicago Cubs to an easy 9-3 victory over the Dodgers at Brooklyn.

The win was the Cubs' third straight and boosted them to within half a game of the National League pace set by New York Giants, who were idle today.

Jurges connected for four singles and drove in three runs. Galan clouted two singles and a homer and also sent three runs across. Between them, they made things easy for Bill Lee, who coasted to his sixth victory of the season, although touched for 10 hits by Brooklyn.

**Pirates Again Beaten**  
The Phillies made it two in a row over the slipping Pittsburgh Pirates at Philadelphia by pounding Bill Swift and Joe Bowman for a 5-4 victory.

Late Pittsburgh rallies in the eighth and ninth innings just missed tying the score as the Phillies caught the potential tying run off third base with one out in the ninth inning to save the victory for Bucky Walters.

**Reds Even Series**  
Cincinnati Reds evened their four-game series with Boston Bees by coming from behind with a two-run rally in the ninth to register a 6-5 victory at Boston.

The Reds pounded Ira Hatcher, son for four runs in the second but the Bees overhauled them by clicking off three runs against Johnny Vander Meer in the third and single tallies off Al Hollingsworth in the fifth and sixth frames.

The Bees nursed that 3-4 lead until the ninth when Cincinnati put two runs across.
