Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but a Sub-Agency on certain conditions.
Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of the three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.
In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$5.00 per acre.
Duties—Six months residence, each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-empt patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.
A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$30 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$500. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

Premier Mathieson scores Opposition Campaign Tactics

(Continued from Page One.)

strict representatives \$12,969; besides extra inspectors and general revision and building up of agricultural staff in connection with the public schools. Now, Mr. Speaker, it seems to me that, putting these three things together, if we should go no further—the killing of \$45,000 annual deficit, the adding to permanent public works of \$224,000; the increased expenditure on education in that period of \$145,489, if we had done nothing to make every loyal citizen in this province bless the day that the old Government went out and a new Government came in. But there are honourable members who will not bless the day. They would probably take the very reverse action if they followed the bent of their inclination, because it is so contrary to the system which they followed in their time. I have never been an advocate of justifying wrongs of the present with wrongs of the past. I think it is poor business and an utter waste of time. But when honourable members undertake to set up a standard of their own and say, "My standard is better than the standard of the Government in power," then we have a right to know just what they did when they sat on the other side of the House. Now, the party opposed to us said at the end of our first period when we had reduced the indebtedness by \$45,000: "Why," they said, "instead of doing that you are responsible for a deficit of \$100,000, and the hon. Leader of the Opposition has been stating publicly that we made a deficit a year ago of \$50,000. A banker who is competent and who desires to tell the truth and does tell the truth says that whereas the amount when we came into power was \$1,072,000, it is now \$1,088,786, that is, \$16,000 more. Now is this \$100,000 a deficit that the "Patriot" and its party told us about that we were responsible for? What is the \$50,000 the hon. Leader of the Opposition says we were responsible for? How can these people look an honest man in the face and not feel that they are marked out as men whose word is worthless? However, some people can look anything in the face. One would hardly believe it, but the hon. Leader of the Opposition was in politics about a quarter of a century ago, and he supported the Government at that time that was responsible for a deficit of \$119,942 in one year, and there was neither storm nor war nor any pest such as we had during last summer, when the hon. gentleman and those who were associated with him formed a conspiracy against political facts and against the progress of the country and spread broadcast through this province a series of mis-statements such as no living man had ever seen before in this province. I challenge them to get up and support the statements they have made in regard to one single matter of importance respecting the public service and prove that what they said was true. But as to proving statements they made were false to fact and injurious to the country, it would take one day to gather them all up and deal with them exploding their fallacies and throwing them into the rubbish heap. They created a deficit of \$119,942 and I have the record here to prove it, and in that same book that records that deficit are recorded the votes of the Leader of the Opposition supporting the party responsible for that deficit. That gentleman, too, continued to support that party that had pillaged the land office. The accounts show that while they drew out of that land office a quarter of a million of dollars of the capital of the country and spent it as ordinary revenue, four hundred thousand of the money of this province was squandered and wasted and lost in that office; and he have the figures here to prove it. That is the Government that the honourable Leader of the Opposition supported when he was in politics before; and he comes down to us now, after a generation has passed away, a Political Rip Van Winkle, and he would introduce the same system of waste and

non-progression that has characterised the time of his former political activities here. He is satisfied with nothing in the way of progress, because progress seems an enemy to him. He was not used to it in the old days. Now, at that time, when such an enormous deficit was rolled up in one year, the charges that have since fallen heavily upon our revenues were light in comparison. Take the cost of the maintenance of the insane and poor: in their time a total of only \$21,000, while today the Government is spending \$59,000 in providing for it; and that expenditure is absolutely essential for the purpose of maintaining those unfortunate people as they should be maintained. Let us see what other expenditures there were in the honourable gentleman's time. They spent \$4,250 for agriculture. Out of the revenues of the province last year the expenditures were \$22,900. Doubtless he would go back to the same old-fashioned methods. In that year, 1893, which was an election year, the estimate of expenditure for public works was \$64,958 and they spent \$120,181, that is fifty-five thousand in excess of their estimates; and if that in the honourable gentleman's time, in a year when floods and storms prevailed, an excess of forty thousand over the estimate is a thing that should not be forgiven, what will we say of the hon. gentleman who blessed the hand that spent \$55,000 out of a revenue much smaller? We had a deficit too, not so very far away, in 1909—a deficit of \$95,938. We had time, out of a revenue of \$99,000, to do it. I do not cite these to show that deficits are good. I have a very great dislike indeed for deficits; and I will show before I have finished that our estimate for the present year is, that we will be able to resume the financial progress in regard to the reduction of expenditure that had marked our regime during the first three years.

PUBLIC SERVICE IMPROVEMENTS.

Let us see where any of the service besides public works have been improved. I referred a little while ago to education, and how this was the most important of all the public services. When we came into power the enrolment had decreased by 5,967; the average daily attendance had decreased in 1915 in 2,901. In the last four years that we have been in power there has been an increase of 1,183; that is, we have regained as much as one-third in our four years of what they lost in twenty years. No man can deny this; yet the hon. Leader of the Opposition will get up and repeat what he said in his speech on the Address in Reply, and he will say he does not think that education is improved. I remember

the hon. member from Port Hill said he doubted whether education was as good as it was 25 years ago, and I think he might well doubt that, because we had declined for twenty years from the position which education had then attained; it had been continually sliding down. During the time the other party was in power we had fewer first-class teachers. We had teachers who were not licensed at all and who were only teaching on permits, more than we had ever had at any previous time in the history of the province since the act of 1877. But the recent schools have been filled in the last four years; the attendance, as I said, has grown so that we have recovered one-third our lost ground. The number of first-class teachers has increased by 20, the number of second-class teachers has increased by 10 and the number of permits, which was 14 when we came in, is now nothing. Now, that surely should satisfy any person who knows now to judge when an educational system is falling or rising. In 1911 the Government spent \$126,438 on education; in 1915 this Government spent \$169,674; and there has been an increase in the total expenditure on education on last year, as compared with the year 1911, of some \$75,772. Teachers have been encouraged to stay in their schools. It is a hard thing to believe and yet the records show it, that the plan that had been adopted by the Government here was to grant a first-class license to a student passing the first-class examination, provided he was going to leave the island; but if he were going to stay at home and teach, they could only give him a second-class license unless he had taught for two years. So that every student passing the first-class examination coming up to the Superintendent of Education was asked the question: "Are you going to stay at home and teach?" If the student said, yes, "Then," replied the Superintendent, "I will give you a second-class license." But if the teacher were going to Alberta or Saskatchewan or elsewhere he was given a first-class license. That way an inducement was held out to the teachers to leave the province and that inducement was acted upon. They took the first-class license and went abroad. Between that and the low pay, the result was that our schools were emptied out.

wood Hospital for the insane that were better fitted for the purpose. He felt an excellent officer and we all felt that when the call came for him to perform the higher duty of a citizen, to go to the war, it would be difficult or impossible to get any person who could take his place. We appointed Dr. Dewar, a former member of this House, to the position of Medical Superintendent of that Institution, and I am very glad indeed to say that he has fitted in and has worked along harmoniously from the beginning. He is doing splendid work; has won the confidence of the whole staff, and there never was a time in our experience when the institution was running more smoothly and satisfactorily. He is making an unqualified success, and no person could say that of any man before trying him in the position. You might take 20 perfect first-class men and not find one of them who would be competent to deal with such a situation as exists there. It requires a certain order of genius, which Dr. Goodwill had. He could go through the most violent wards, and whenever he went he spread quietness and peace and smoothed down fretfulness and anger, discontent and noise, and a strange thing is that Dr. Dewar can do the same, and is doing it. If hon. members would like to go out to the institution I would be glad to provide the means of transportation so that they could inspect it for themselves; because we are all interested, and deeply interested, in the unfortunate people there, who carry with them a misfortune which is worse than death. We have had a large number of questions put by the Opposition so far; an unprecedented number of questions, an unreasonable and ridiculous number of questions; and among the rest they have put in scores and scores of questions in regard to the Asylum. Throughout this province, while the election was going on, I heard at every meeting I attended the same series of statements, that tenders were no longer called for for supplies to the Asylum, but that favorites of the Government were allowed to supply goods at any price they pleased, and some hon. gentleman quoted the price of meat as 15 cents, and that was the price I remember I attended one meeting in Port Augustus district and there was present at that meeting a dismissed door-keeper of the House and a former contractor for the Asylum and two or three disappointed persons; and those men took the platform one after another. They were put forward ahead of the candidates running,

Dr. Goodwill, who has been there for a number of years, had organized his staff and modernised his system until there were very few if any institutions of the size of Falcon-

and they told their stories. I never in my life heard such fabrications on political platforms. The same thing happened not only in Port Augustus district but in the district adjoining. I was surprised and shocked to hear the statements hon. members made. I do not believe they knew that what they were saying was not true. I do not believe they would get up wilfully and state that supplies to the Asylum were not let by tender but that all was a lot of political favorites and prices were enormous. But some person was responsible for supplying that false information; and I am afraid our serene friend, who has wakened up after 25 years of political banishment, was the chief one who manufactured the poisoned gases spread throughout the country. I have here a statement that shows the cost per capita in the Asylum covering a period of years, and I will show you how false were the statements so freely made throughout the campaign. Taking the average cost per patient in the institution, that is Falconwood and the Provincial Infirmary, from 1901 to 1911, each year \$2.70; the average cost from 1912 to 1915 \$2.81, an increase of 11 cents; and every person knows that during the past four years and particularly while the war was on, the prices of goods increased beyond all former standards.
