THE ALASKAN BOUNDARY QUESTION.

Reduced to its simplest form the Alaskan boundary dispute is a question of what constitutes the coast of a country. The treaty of 1825 between Great Britain and Russia was intended to settle the boundary between the American possessions of the two countries. From Mount St. Elias to the Arctic Ocean the boundary was fixed on the 141st meridian and so far there is no dispute. But south west of Mount St. Elias for a distance of some 550 miles the treaty secured to Russia a fringe of thirty miles broad inward from the coast. Here the trouble arises from the fact that for a distance of hundreds of miles there are islands thickly studding the sea over a width of thirty or more miles. These islands are quite large and lie close together, being only separated by narrow passages or straits. The Canadian contention is in brief that the western or outer side of these islands constitutes the "coast" named in the treaty and that the islands are the fringe of land allotted to Russia.

The American contention is that the islands are not to be taken into account at all, and that the "coast" is the water boundary of the mainland. As a matter of fact they have and hold possession of the strip of the mainland which they claim. Most Americans, having heard but little on the subject save their own side of the story, are fully assured that their claim is correct, while most Canadians, little better informed, feel sure that the territory in dispute is ours. We share this opinion, but none the less it is a matter of doubt whether we shall be able to convince a board of impartial arbitrators that the Canadian contention is correct. And it is but fair to our readers that they should know in advance what our opponents consider to be the strong points of their case and the weak points of our case.

In the first place it is to be observed that the United States has possession of the territory in dispute. In the next place it is claimed that both American and British maps show the strip of territory in question on the mainland as belonging to the United States. Again it is pointed out that the treaty of 1825 is loosely drawn, the names of places, straits and inlets being different from what they are now, so that it would be extremely difficult to establish the Canadian case, however just it may be. Furthermore it is contended that very little value was set upon the territory in question by either Britain or Russia in 1825, save that there were then some Russian settlements or trading posts both on the islands and the mainland which it was the object of the treaty to confirm to Russia.

There is still a further point to be met, if the Canadian contention is to be made good. It is found in the sixth article of the treaty, which reads as follows: It is understood that the subjects of His Britannic Majesty, from whatever quarter they may arrive, whether from the ocean or from the interior of the continent, shall, forever, enjoy the right of navigating freely, and without any hindrance whatever, all the rivers and

streams which, in their course toward the Pacific Ocean, may cross the line (traverseront la ligne) of demarcation upon the strip of coast described in Article III. of the present convention.

In connection with this article our opponents say that the right of free navigation of the rivers here secured to British subjects would be quite meaningless if the mainland is conceded to belong to Britain. If only the Islands and not the mainland coast belonged then to Russia the rivers in question would have been wholly in British territory and no provision would be needed to secure the free navigation to British subjects. Such are the salient features of the case against Canada in this boundary matter. It is as well that Guardian readers, all of whom desire to be well-informed, should know both sides of the case.

The results of over twenty Arctic and Antarctic expeditions have been that the nearest approach made to the north pole was that of the Duke d'Abruzzi's expedition in 1900 which came within about 243 miles, while no one has come nearer the south pole than about 766 miles, that being in the same year 1900 by the Borohgrevink expedition.

SUPREME COURT.
