EGYPT IS GRIPPED BY POLITICAL CRISIS

CHAMBER OF DEPUTIES IN UPROAR

Senate Joins Deputies In Voting Lack Of Confidence In Government.

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) CAIRO, Jan. 3.—The Chamber of Deputies in a riotous session tonight voted a lack of confidence in the Government King Farouk chose to succeed the ousted Nationalist Premier Mustapha Nahas Pasha.

After the vote the deputies left the parliament buildings through hundreds of feet and mounted police. The majority went to the nearby club of the Nationalist Wafist political party.

CANADIAN RECOVERY IS SOUND

AGRICULTURE BRIGHTER

AVIATION STRIDES

Reviewing aviation, Transport Minister C. D. Howe declared all his branches showed increased activity in 1937. He anticipated final figures would show passengers, mail and freight transported by air in 1937 increased by 10 per cent over 1936.
