In the election trial of Louis P. Tanton, petitioner and Lemuel E. Prowse, respondent, the session opened Saturday morning at ten o'clock. John J. Campbell was the first witness and being examined by Mr. McKeen stated that he was engaged in the railway survey last fall. On Saturday night previous to the election he procured a horse and wagon and drove out to Brackley Point Road from Charlottetown. He paid for the horse himself. The witness swore he was not in Prowse Bros. store. He went to Souris on the special train in election day but at his own expense. He saw no one on the train. George Hickox being called said he had voted on election day. He did some bridge work on Mill River, Lot 32, Messrs Prowse and Warburton came out to his place about the first of September, but no conversation regarding the election took place. He received twenty dollars for the work, though whether he received the money before or after the election he could not tell. The witness did not know who paid him. He was in Prowse Bros. store before the election and Mr. Prowse took him over to Mr. Cumiskey's office, and introduced him to that gentleman. He had a conversation about the bridge he wanted to fix, and he got the work.

Augustus Hermans said that he voted at the last election. He was not speaking to L. E. Prowse in October, excepting the Saturday night before the election, when he complained to Mr. Prowse that they were not going to hold the poll at his shop, which on account of the posturing being put up in front of his building he naturally thought they would. Mr. Prowse said it could not be helped but that he would give him the local pole.

Norman Sheidow was the next witness. He voted in the election had attended no meetings, and took no active part. He might possibly have canvassed some people. The witness's answers were for the most part extremely vague, but under pressure he admitted that he had given liquor to William Acorn on election day, though he claimed this had not been Mr. Acorn's vote. Mr. Acorn on being examined stated he had met Sheidow on election day, and he had given him whisky. Nothing was said about the election.

A handsome new pulpit was placed in St. Peter's Cathedral last week, and was used for the first time yesterday. It was designed by W. C. Harris, architect, and is in keeping with the Reredos, Choir Stalls and Rood-screen, and adds very much to the appearance of the church. The body and base of the pulpit are of quartered oak, with carved panels of mahogany. The cornice and superstructure are in the latter wood.

On one of the lower panels a brass tablet, bearing the following inscription: "To the Glory of God, and in Loving Memory of Marion Campuell Simpson, 1821-1907. Jesus Mercy." The pulpit is the gift of Miss Jessie Simpson, and was made in the workshop of George Gaudin, the wood-carver, and the carving by Wm. Whitlock. The Sanctuary of the Memorial Chapel has also received further adornment. Last year the seven niches above the altar were filled with statues of the Apostles, with our Lord preaching as the central figure in memory of Fred. C. Brecken. Now the remaining niches on the right and left of the altar have been fitted and are as follows: St. Matthew, late Rector of Three Rivers, P. E. I.; St. John and St. Jude, in memory of Henry P. and Rufus P. Chard; St. James the Less, in memory of the children of Robt. Hogg; St. Andrew in memory of Andrew Bordon, Mitchell; St. James the Great in memory of the children of Mrs. James Peake; St. Thomas in memory of Thomas J. and Mrs. Haviland; St. Simon in memory of Robt. Haviland and Mrs. Sydney Fitzgerald. Under each figure is small brass tablet bearing the name of the person commemorated. A large figure of St. Peter has also been placed in the niche on the right hand side of the porch, completing the decorations of this part of the building. The work upon the chapel is nearing completion, and without doubt the interior will be the most beautiful of its kind in Canada. Every day from 7 a. m. to 6 p. m. the building is open and a visit is well worth while.

At a meeting of the central committee representing Hazelbrook, Alexandria and Orca Roads churches, lately, a most unanimous invitation was extended the Rev. The Railway Commission, with their party, accompanied by Superintendent Sharpe, Messrs. Huggan, Poole, Hodgson, MacDonald, and Bathune, of the P. E. I., Charlottetown, J. W. Richards of P. E. I., and A. B. Warburton, M. P., arrived in Summerside by special train in charge of Conductor Stetson, about one o'clock yesterday and after lunch through to the Clifton House, proceeded to Summerside about eight p. m. and at 9 o'clock the Commission met with the members of the Board of Trade, and Town Council in the Council Chamber, Mayor Saunders in the chair.

The first matter brought to their attention was the taking of water by the railway through the town system. This matter will receive their attention this morning. The next matter brought to their attention was that of better shipping facilities on the railway wharf. A plan of the railway property, with the proposed changes was shown by the Board of Trade and discussed by the Commissioners, and several of the citizens. The question of the new station at Summerside was also brought up during this discussion, but from the remarks of Commissioner Butler this matter is not likely to receive much attention for some years. During the discussion, which was taken part in by A. D. Bell, Neil McQuarrie, Dr. MacLellan, President Stewart of the Board of Trade, J. A. Brace and others, several demands were made of the Commissioners as follows: That the winter freight rates on the Cape Tormentine to Montreal and points east, be made the same as the summer route by way of Pictou, Chene and Pictou. That the Commissioners do their best to arrange both the N. B. and P. E. I. Railways for a through rate, during the time that the new recognition of Summerside as the chief shipping point on the Island be given in the Tables, and literature, distributed by the I. C. R. and P. E. I. Railways. Mr. Stewart in his remarks drew the attention of the Commissioners to the manner in which local freight is paid east of Summerside to points east of Summerside. In answer to this complaint Supt. Sharpe said he would look into it and do his best to have it remedied. This morning the commissioners with a committee of the citizens will take up fully the questions brought up by the citizens at a meeting last night.

Dealers in Alberton yesterday were paying 16 to 18 per pound for butter. A dozen for eggs, \$8 a lb for pork, 48c a lb for oats, \$9 a ton for hay, 7c a lb for hides and 25c a bus for potatoes.
