**In Memoriam**

**MR. CHRISTOPHER LEPAGE**

Mr. Christopher LePage, one of the most prominent residents of Rustico, passed on his eternal rest on the morning of Thursday the 19th inst. He lived and he died on the same place. There he spent a life reaching to four score and an advanced age, of whom it was never left his native land. Mr. LePage carried on farming at Rustico and by his persevering industry, untiring devotion to husbandry, coupled with thrift and the study of progressive methods of agriculture, he brought his farm to the highest state of cultivation. He may truly be numbered with the pioneers of Prince Edward Island, for when the farm came into his possession his greater area had to be brought under

der cultivation. Although he spent about ten years, between the Island and the sister provinces. He had fitted himself both as a ship builder and navigator, from his own studies, and this incident will give some idea of the ability, knowledge and determination of the late Christopher LePage.

In his passing another link connecting the past and the present has been severed. He was ever regarded as one of the stalwarts of his day. His advice was sought, and his day was sound, his example was worthy of emulation. He saw his duty and he did it, and he ever laboured as in his daily walk and conversation he showed that he looked upon life from a clear viewpoint, and his ideals were such as characterized the man of action and the man of vision.

The fact that he had confidence in his homeland was evidenced in his splendid achievement in settling his five sons in the community where he spent his own life. He is gone to the Better Land, and he leaves behind him a name that will be cherished and a memory that will all who knew him.

There are left to mourn a widow, (Millicent Woolner), five sons, namely: James L., on the homestead, Oliver, nearby in Rustico, Garfield at Rusticoville, and Elisha G. at North Rustico, and Hon. Bradford in W.-M. E. C. in Charlottetown; also one daughter, Mrs. Clara Dupew, of Boston, who came home for the funeral.

The funeral took place on Sunday afternoon from the home to Rustico Cemetery. Rev. Peter Jackson and Rev. C. S. Johnston officiated. The former in referring to the deceased took for his text: "A workman that needeth not to be ashamed." He spoke most appropriately and touchingly of the late Mr. Christopher LePage.

The floral offerings were very numerous, including a magnificent wreath from the Government of which Mr. B. W. LePage is a member.

The pall bearers were as follows: Walter Buntain, Granville Buntain, Ernest Bulman, John Clarke, Frederick Toombs, and James Stevenson.

Notwithstanding the unusually cold weather there was a large number of people present to pay their last respects.
