## TO MAKE CANNING MORE PROFITABLE.

MONTREAL, June 6.—At the annual convention of the Canada-wide sale grocers' exchange, which opened here today, with fifty delegates present from all portions of the Dominion, a deputation was received from the Dominion Cannery, Limited, the merger which controls most of the vegetables and fruit packing establishments. The Cannery's deputation was headed by Mr. Nesbitt, M. P. for North Oxford, and presented a draft agreement for the season's business. The general opinion was expressed by the convention that conditions in the canned goods trade last year were neither pleasing nor profitable and before any agreement was entered into to the trade would have to get better conditions regarding price, conditions of delivery and discounts. The argument of the cannery was that they were trying to arrange the business so that it would be profitable to all without over-taxing the public by consolidating the producing end to ensure economy and so fixing selling prices by wholesalers that there shall be no profit killing rate cutting.

LONDON, June 6.—It is stated that the scheme for complete administrative separation of the self-governing from the Crown Colonies in the Colonial Office will be complete by the spring of 1911.

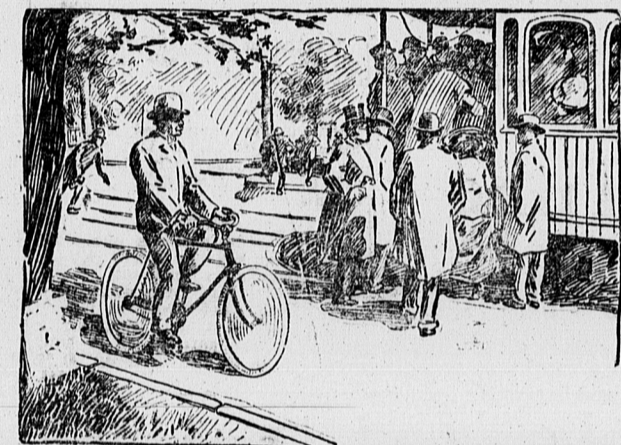
