X-Ray Telescope Has Possibilities

NEW YORK, May 19—(AP)—An "X-ray telescope" announced today promises to give doctors living movies telling scores of things about the human body that they couldn't see before.

In effect, it nearly brings sunlight into the human body. It can make X-ray images on a fluorescent screen 500 times brighter than they now are, Westinghouse research laboratories scientists said. It was developed by Dr. John W. Coltman, 32-year-old physicist. This tremendous brightness is the exciting development, because it shows so much more detail about internal organs. Dr. W. Edward Chamberlain, Philadelphia physician who suggested the idea, said it would make it far easier to spot cancer and tuberculosis quickly, to study the human heart in action, and even to diagnose kidney troubles early.

He predicted the bright pictures would make mass surveys for cancer feasible, and that doctors eventually may look inside every patient in hospitals to help learn what's wrong.

A kind of telescope tube does the brightness trick. It's a telescope in the sense that it magnifies brightness. The tube picks up the X-rays after they pass through the body and turns them into light rays and then into electrons inside the tube. The electrons then are hurled across the tube at speed of 5,000 miles a second. They hit a fluorescent screen so hard that they make a much brighter image.

Native Of O'Leary Retires In Mass.

Over 1,500 Delegates Will Attend Dominion Legion Convention

Veterans from all parts of Canada are now en route to Saskatoon to attend the Dominion Convention of the Canadian Legion from May 23rd to 27th.

More than 1,500 delegates are expected to attend the veterans' parliament. Among the principal resolutions to be discussed will be ones on pensions, housing, employment, communism, national defence and immigration.

While Communism has not made any great inroads in the Legion, nevertheless many delegates are going prepared to strengthen the Legion's constitution on the admittance of those professing this doctrine.

The Governor General Viscount Alexander, Grand Patron of the Legion, will officially open the convention. Also in attendance will be Sir Richard Howard-Vyse, honorary treasurer of the British Legion; Major Ernest Harston, honorary secretary of the British Empire Service League and Colonel Wm. Rae, the Canadian Legion's representative on the B.E.S.L. Council.

It is expected that a large number of veterans of World War II will be present. A considerable number of them are already filling executive positions in the organization.

Who will be the new leader of the 300,000 members comprising the strength of the Legion is unknown. Major General C. B. Price, the present president, has signified that he will be unable to tackle another term of office.

Chairman of the Convention Committee is Brigadier Alex. Ross of Yorkton, Sask.

In attendance from Prince Edward Island will be Major J. A. MacDonald, Cardigan, president of the Provincial Command; Major N. W. Lowther, provincial representative on the Dominion Command; Lieut.-Col. L. T. Lowther and J. S. Walker of this City; Lester Jenkins, Summerside; George Gordon Montague; and William Sanderson Kinross.

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New Scholarship Announced At U.N.B.

FREDERICTON, May 19—(CP)—It was announced early this afternoon by Dr. A. F. Baird, dean of electrical engineering, and acting president of the University of New Brunswick, that a new scholarship has been set up at the University to be known as the Fannie Bell Memorial Scholarship in the memory of Miss Fannie Bell of Shediac who has left the University the residue of her estate which amounts to \$50,000 for this purpose.

The awarding of the scholarship Dr. Baird said will be left entirely to the faculty and will be given to deserving students who need assistance. Just how many scholarships, the tenure and the amount has not yet been decided. Miss Bell, who was a well known nurse in Shediac and who practised her profession for a great many years in United States, became interested in the University some time ago and has shown her interest in the institution by her will, Dr. Baird pointed out.

Surgeons Praise Halifax Hospital

HALIFAX, May 18—(CP)—Members of the American College of Surgeons, inspecting the new Victoria General Hospital here today, said they believed it was "the best institution of its kind in the British Empire." Dr. Malcolm T. MacEachern, chairman of the college's administrative board, said the hospital could constitute the basis for a new medical centre in Halifax.
