#### DEPOSITS AND FORFEITS.

The Trades and Labor Council of Toronto want the federal Parliament to do away with the \$200 deposit in elections. We think that in this they are right. It is a handicap upon the poor man in politics. Why should the candidate representing no matter how small a minority be called upon to forfeit \$200 if he does not happen to receive half the number of votes which the successful candidate obtains? No doubt this deposit business may sometimes prevent an election being held and as an election by acclamation costs a little less than one which is contested some money is saved. But if the country is too poor or too mean to pay the cost of conducting elections it might as well abolish its representative institutions. The Guardian would be glad to see all deposits and forfeits in elections swept away. They are aimed at the poor men's and working men's candidates. They are a part of the scheme to give the control of the country to the rich. If the labor unions will take this matter up in earnest and with united effort the deposit system will be swept away as it ought to be.

#### RUSSIAN AND JAPANESE CREDIT.

In spite of the fact that Russia has an enormous debt while that of Japan is small in comparison, and while Russia has suffered defeat and Japan won as many victories, the credit of Russia is still much the better of the two in the world's money markets. On November 30 in Paris, Russian imperial 4 per cents were quoted above 94 while Japanese 4 per cents were quoted at 75. The London quotations for Russian securities were not quite so high as those of Paris, but the difference in price between the two securities was in London 17 1/2 points as against a difference of 9 points in Paris. One reason for this difference is that Russia has been long a large borrower and has met her financial obligations well, while Japan is an almost entirely new applicant for loans in the western money market. Another element is found in the fact that should Russia suffer ultimate defeat in the war and be permanently driven out of Manchuria it would in no wise affect the solid stability of the Empire, while if Japan should be finally defeated it might prove both political and financially ruinous.

Goldwin Smith, who is not deterred by many past failures, now predicts that the next election will place a Conservative Government in power in Ontario.

The New York Central Railway Company has bought the Ottawa and New York Railway, which runs from the Dominion capital southward to the St. Lawrence. It is promised that the Canadian part of the road will be speedily improved up to the standard of the Vanderbilt system.

It is again given out that Mr. Blair will make a public statement shortly. This may turn out to be true, but the public have grown chary of such statements since the repeated announcements that he would take a hand in the late federal campaign failed to materialize. Nothing he could now say will evoke half as much interest as something hot off the fire would have created a month ago.

#### SMALL CRUP OF PROTESTS.

So far there seems to be a general disposition to accept the results of the recent elections as final. We are now within about a week of the latest date within which protests can be filed and so far as we have heard but one such document has been registered, that being the case of Mr. Sealey, the Liberal candidate in Wentworth, Ont., who received a majority of the votes but was counted out by the County Judge, who rejected all the ballots at one poll where the returning officer had numbered them.

On general principles the absence of protests is to be commended. It would be difficult to tell which party has gained or lost most by election trials in the past. Most commonly, but not always, if the seated member is unseated he is afterward re-elected by an increased majority. In many cases in the past a lot of protests on one side have been "swapped off" against a like number on the other side—an often immoral and always unedifying spectacle. Usually the parties who profit most in election trials are not the politicians, or the country, but the lawyers.

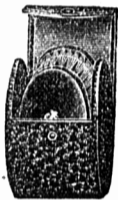
