McAvoy Scores Second Round K. O. Over Smith

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, Feb. 17.—Jock McAvoy, British middleweight and light-heavyweight champion, scored an easy knockout over Jim Smith of Philadelphia in the second round of their scheduled 10-round bout here tonight.

The weights were 171 for McAvoy and 159 for Smith. The finish came after 2:22 of fighting in the second. McAvoy drove Smith into the ropes with a shower of vicious lefts and rights, then uncocked a paralyzing left to the jaw that sent the Philadelphian sprawling.

Previously, in the same hour, Englishman had floored Smith for a count of nine, also with a left-hand belt.

McAvoy, who is matched to meet John Henry Lewis for the light heavyweight title on March 13, was to get away tonight but once he warmed up there was little doubt as to the outcome.

Spotting McAvoy almost twelve pounds, Smith surprised the crowd of 5,000 by wading in to capture the first round with a flurry of vicious punching that kept McAvoy on the defensive, had the customers in a frenzy of excitement and forced the Briton to cover up during the last minute of the round.

Flushed with his success, the young Philadelphian continued his aggressive tactics at the start of the second. His desire to land a hay-maker laid him so wide open to McAvoy's attack, it was comparatively easy for the wily Briton to close in and wind up proceedings with his deadly left.

The first time Smith went down, he elected to take a count of nine and get his rest, but the second time he was on the floor for keeps. He hadn't so much as opened an eye when the count of seven was tolled off and referee Johnny McAvoy waved his arm, indicating it was all over.

The fight drew approximately 10,000.

Leafs, Hawks To Play Series In Vancouver

VANCOUVER, Feb. 17.—Toronto Maple Leafs and Chicago Black Hawks of the National Hockey League will play a series of four post-season exhibition games here early in April, President E. W. Rhodes of the Vancouver Gyro Club announced today.

Rhodes said the invitation to Conny Smythe to bring his Leafs and any other major league club to the series was accepted in word received from the Toronto manager today.

Four games will be played, three at night and one in the afternoon for children only.

TORONTO, Feb. 17.—Prospects of a post-season series in Vancouver between Toronto Maple Leafs and Chicago Black Hawks of the National Hockey League "look promising," manager Conny Smythe of the Leafs said today, but the western trip hasn't been decided on definitely.

Leafs manager said he had agreed "in principle" to a four-game exhibition series in April, but he hadn't "closed entirely" with the coast city's Gyro Club. "It's a 10 to 1 shot that we'll go, though," he declared.

Before the trip could be made, Smythe explained permission must be obtained from the N.H.L. and players from both teams must be lined up. Financial terms offered were satisfactory.

LeBlanc Top Scorer Of Senior Group

By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, Feb. 17.—Frankie LeBlanc, veteran Montreal forward and sparkplug of the champion Royals of the Montreal Senior Group since the departure of Dave Neville and Ralph St. Germain for the Olympic team, ended the hockey season as top scorer of the champions, scoring statistics showed tonight.

LeBlanc scored 21 goals, 10 assists for 31 points to stand in third place in the league. Only Tag Millar, Ottawa, and George Brown, Verdun Maple Leafs, were ahead of him. Roy's have ended their schedule while Ottawa and Verdun have another game to play. Millar has 20-19-39 and Brown 17-19-36.

Ray Malenfant and Rene Boudreau of Canadiens, both formerly of Moncton, scored 15-5-19 and 8-10-10, respectively.

Golden Miller Ruled Favorite

LONDON, Feb. 17.—Miss Dorothy Page's nine year old bay gelding Golden Miller is favored in the latest callover to win the 1936 4-1-2 mile Grand National on March 27 at Aintree. The Miller is quoted today at six to one, followed by Major Noel Furlong's Reynolds-ton, last year's winner at 10 to one.

George H. "Pete" Bostwick's Castle Irwell is the third favorite at 15 to one. Others ranking low in the betting odds are Belted Hero and Delaineige at 18 to one, Double Crossed at 22 to one, Blue Prince and Avenger at 26 to one and Briens at 28 to one.

Golden Miller, a strong favorite last year that failed, carries top weight of 175.

A callover of odds for the one mile Lincolnshire handicap, at Lincoln March 28, today revealed Priox a slight favorite at 100 to six and Zee Bequest at 100 to six.

Others quoted include: Overcoat and Law Court at 20 to one, Lordling at 22 to one, Precious Pearl, Rosecras, Hidalgo, Mistral Third, Coer and the Blue Boy at 25 to one, Tom Bowling at 28 to one, G. Zingaro, Screamer, Jovial Lad, Hincroft Bridge at 33 to one and Princess, Herodene and Spasm at 40 to one.

Foster Rated One Of Stars Of Olympics

GARMISCH-PARTENKIRCHEN, Germany, Feb. 17.—In the top flight of individual stars of the Fourth Olympic Winter Games, in line with such international celebrities as Sonja Henie, Karl Schafer, Birger Rudd and Ivar Ballangrud, stood a Canadian hockey player today. There was no greater star in these games than Jimmy Foster, of Moncton and Winnipeg.

It was Foster who won the hockey championship for England, who took the title away from his own Canada for the first time in history. It was he who directly brought about the most amazing upset of the games. No other star in the Games worked under the handicaps he carried.

Jimmy Foster, who used to work for the Canadian Pacific Railway shops at Winnipeg, played his first hockey on this side of the Atlantic last fall when he went to England from Moncton, N.B., and joined the Richmond Hawks. Although he was born in the old country, Jimmy was brought up and learned to play goal in Winnipeg.

He had achieved as much in Canadian amateur hockey as any player could expect. He was acknowledged to be a superior net-man in 1931 when he moved from Winnipeg to Moncton and joined the powerful Hawks of the Maritime Hockey Association. Foster made his big reputation with the Moncton team.

In the spring of 1933 the Hawks won the Allan Cup and Canadian senior championship. They travelled across Canada to Vancouver for the finals in which Foster did not permit the western champions, Saskatoon Quakers, a single goal in two games.

Moncton repeated their national conquest in 1934 with Foster in the nets and whipped Detroit White Stars, United States amateur champions, in a series for the North American championship. England is the second country Jimmy has represented in international hockey affairs.

When he went to England last fall he fell under the ban of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association but Canadian officials here made representations in his behalf so that his suspension automatically applied by the International Ice Hockey Federation, was lifted to allow him to play for England.

And Jimmy thanked Canada by winning the tournament for England. The 30-year-old Winnipegger and Moncton ace set up an astonishing record in the seven games his team played. He allowed only three goals to be scored on him, registering four shutouts.

In front of him was a team with little scoring punch, an aggregation that was outplayed by Canada, the United States and Germany. But it wasn't beaten because Foster was too good. Canada scored once on him and Germany once. The third goal was scored by Hungary after the English defense had eased him to a 5-0 lead.

England scored only 17 goals in seven games, compared to Canada's 54 in eight games. Sweden nearly beat England, Japan made a good showing, the United States got a scoreless tie. It was England's last line of defense—padded Jimmy Foster—that failed to fail.
