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NAZI STEAMROLLER IS SLOWED BY RED ARMIES

Discuss Japanese Question In Commons Soviets Begin To Put Reserves Into Battle Line

River - Rail Region Where Russia Fights Invader

B.C. Members Claim Some In Defence Areas

War Situation Last Night

Moscow Reports Little Change In Positions In Past 24 Hours; Heavy Fighting Continues.

Hitler's first objective in his drive to destroy or immobilize mighty Russia before Anglo-American striking power can intervene is appallingly close to attainment within less than six weeks of the onset of the campaign.

Moscow Reports Little Change In Positions In Past 24 Hours; Heavy Fighting Continues.

OTTAWA, July 29 (CP)—Claims that Japanese were still at liberty in protected areas of British Columbia and delaying authority in work camps were made in the House of Commons today by members from that province.

Isolated in that manner from the rest of Russia, the Caucasus would be left to surely Nazi dissection to obtain the oil it holds. Moreover, if Hitler reaches the Caspian down the west bank of the Volga, he will have established virtually the complete southern half of a strong defensive short line across Russia from the Baltic to the Caspian, German seizure of Leningrad and Moscow would complete a 1,500-mile holding front for his armies, as compared to the 2,000-mile front along which they now are deployed, and permit him to turn westward again.

MOSCOW, July 30—(Thursday) — (AP) — The Russian armies of the South were reported throwing reserves into the bitter battle against the Germans today and the Soviet Wednesday midnight communique indicated the Nazi steamroller had made little if any progress in the previous 24 hours.

Howard Green (Con. Vancouver South), who initiated the debate on a motion to go into supply, urged that Aug. 15 be fixed as a deadline after which no Japanese could remain in a protected area. He also advised the establishment of one town, suggesting Wainwright, Alta., as the site, for concentration of all Japanese.

Seemingly inevitable rupture of the Russian front from the Black Sea to the Volga if not the Caspian Sea does not mean imminent German occupation of the whole Caucasian Isthmus, however. Russian chances for prolonged defence of the main Raku oil fields, still more than 600 miles south of the nearest Nazi spearhead beyond the Don, are good.

While dispatches from the battlefield said the Russians finally were beginning to put their huge manpower reserve into action, the communique merely said that "fiercer engagements" with the enemy were fought in the Tsimlyansk and Bataisk areas of the Don and Caucasus and on the northern end of that flaming front in the Voronezh area.

TORONTO, July 29 (CP)—M. J. Coldwell, C.C.F. Leader in the House of Commons, today was elected National President of the Co-operative Commonwealth Federation at its convention here. Three other members of the party were nominated but declined to contest the presidency.

OTTAWA, July 29 (CP)—Labor Minister Mitchell told the House of Commons tonight it was not the government policy to place British Columbia Japanese in internment camps and he was "not afraid" of the situation in Vancouver where some Japanese remain.

Dark as the Russian outlook is with the Lower Don line lost or at best badly cracked, these factors offer some cheer. They also may figure in whatever revision of Anglo-American plans may have been forced by the German advances in Russia.

On the critical Caucasian battlefield at Bataisk, 15 miles south of Rostov, the Russians said heavy fighting continued throughout the day. Infantry troops defending one important position, supported by tanks and planes, wiped out about 2,000 German men and officers.

Farmer Fatally Injured In Fall

LONDON, July 30 (THURSDAY) (CP) German nuisance raiders flying singly attacked London, the Midlands and East Anglia in full moonlight early today, dropped a few bombs in the greater London area and hurried away under the fire of new, secret anti-aircraft guns which were still firing when the all-clear sounded.

Kletskaia is on the Don River well south of Voronezh. (This opening of a new front might indicate the German army are attempting to swing a northern arm across the Don and down against Stalingrad, on the Volga.)

Mr. James E. MacCallum, 74-year-old farmer of Harrington, died last evening from injuries received in a fall from a load of hay on Monday. The aged farmer was unloading a truck when the accident occurred. He was pulling the trip rope when it broke and he tumbled backwards to the ground. His shoulder and spine were injured and medical aid was summoned immediately.

Scattered attacks in the Midlands and East Anglia were on a small scale, said the report. It was estimated between 50 and 70 planes crossed the coast.

SYDNEY, N. S., July 29 (CP)—About 100 carpenters and bricklayers at the big steel plant here remained on strike tonight while union officials conferred with the strikers with a view to conciliation.

OTTAWA, July 29 (CP)—Police searched tonight for two armed men who earlier today estimated \$43,000 from the Bank of Montreal branch at Prior and Main streets after gagging and tying up the four employees and forcing the acting manager, R. W. Harris, to open an upstairs vault containing the cash.

Other raiders, taking advantage of the full moon, were over two districts of East Anglia. Alarms sounded in London Monday night in the Capital's first night alert since June 3. Anti-aircraft batteries were in action but no bombs were dropped in the Monday alarm.

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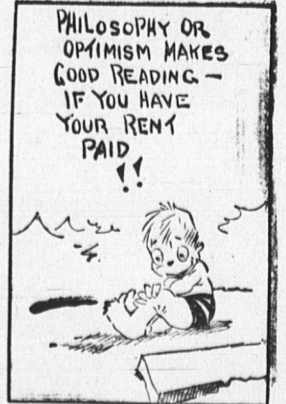
