**Campaign To Secure Workers From Farms**

The Manager of the Local Office of National Selective Service, Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, today stated that many men are being secured for the winter months, are needed for jobs in other essential industries. A minimum of 150,000 men has been secured, and while the requirements have not by any means been met, instructions have been issued by Arthur MacNamura, Director of National Selective Service at Ottawa, that each Local Office is to intensify its efforts to secure more men to accept work off the farm for the winter.

The Director's instructions emphasize the following points:  
 1. While men from the farms are urgently needed elsewhere, no man should leave agriculture, if he is needed as a farm worker for the winter.  
 2. Men will, of course, return to the farm once again, when their services are required, and the regular wages for whatever job they accept, and transportation will be provided free if a distance has to be traveled.  
 3. Men from the farm, already given postponement under the Military Callup program, will continue on postponement if they leave the farm to take other approved essential employment for the winter.

**Queen's Fund Sends Gift For Children's Christmas Appeal**

Hundreds of thousands of children in Great Britain will be given Christmas treats this year by the Lord Mayor's Fund. Over \$25,000 was given for this purpose last year by the Children's Christmas Appeal of the Queen's Canadian Fund.

With a Britain that is fully mobilized families in large numbers have been broken up. Children have been separated from their parents by dislocation of war. Tremendous numbers have been evacuated from danger areas and countless others sent to nurseries and country homes after being bombed out of their own homes.

Canadians can help bring Christmas cheer in the form of candies, toys, as well as necessary articles of clothing, to children who would otherwise go without—children who have already had an extra share of suffering through the years of war.

Thousands of dollars have already come in from across Canada, and the Fund today is calling \$1,000 so that the Lord Mayor's staff can get plans under way. There is still plenty of time between now and Christmas, and accumulated donations will be cabled to London as frequently as possible. The parties will be held, and food and clothing and toys given away during the Christmas and New Year season.
