MRS. GLOVER SAYS LIFE WAS HAPPY

presence of Hattie Le Blanc, nor had her husband called her vile names in return. Never had she told Hattie that she would kill her husband, or that she would have him put out of the way...

After they moved into the Main street house there was nothing outside of the bathroom incident between Mr. Glover and Hattie Le Blanc and a few spats over the dog, to mar the quiet serenity of their existence, according to Mrs. Glover.

"The date of the bathroom incident," testified Mrs. Glover, "was March 29, 1909. I had been ill and under a doctor's care that day. At 10:15 o'clock when I went down to the bathroom and found Hattie and Mr. Glover together, I told Hattie to go upstairs, and then I talked to Mr. Glover. I wanted to get a divorce as a result of the incident, so the next day I went to see Mr. Stark, a Waltham lawyer, to find out about it.

William H. McCull, superintendent of the Waltham laundry, testified that Seymour Glover worked in the laundry for a salary of \$15 per week, and that he was a faithful worker. As far as he had observed, the relations between Mr. and Mrs. Glover were always pleasant. He had never heard them speak harshly to each other.

Samuel D. Elmore testified that he knew Clarence Glover for nine or ten years before the murder was drawn, and had handled law cases for him. He had never observed any ill will between Mr. and Mrs. Glover. Glover first spoke to him about making a will on Jan. 20, 1909. At that time Mr. Glover told him he wished to provide for his wife and children, but that he did not want to leave the property to her outright.

REINFORCEMENT FOR CANTON DISTRICT SHANGHAI, May 3—Heavy reinforcements of troops have been ordered into the Cantonese district, according to a Pekin dispatch this afternoon, following a report of a battle between outlaws and imperial troops along the Wu Chow and Canton road. Many were reported killed on both sides and the fighting was still in progress. The best regiments of the Chinese army are being ordered south.

SHOE TRUST IS KING WASHINGTON, May 3—The declaration that a "trust" grips the entire shoe manufacturing industry of the United States was made today before the senate committee on finance, which began hearings on the Canadian reciprocity bill. Manufacturers from the middle west told the committee that they were practically at the mercy of the United Shoe Machinery company of Boston.

The firemen were called out twice in this city yesterday for a fire. The first call was about 8:30 for a fire in a double tenement house on Richmond Street opposite the jail. When the firemen arrived the roof was a mass of flames and only their strenuous efforts saved the building from entire destruction. One of the tenants moved yesterday afternoon to a house on Rockford Street. It is said that the building was purchased the day before the fire by a party in Southport whose tenure of possession, if such be the case, was not long in being disturbed by the tenants. The second alarm was given about 11:30 for a slight fire in a pile of rubbish in the yard back of the old Bank of Commerce building on Great George Street, which is now being remodelled for the new Government offices. There was no damage.

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QUEEN MARY'S FURS

LONDON, May 2—Queen Mary's liking for rich furs is well known to her more intimate friends. She has one of the most valuable collections in the world, and it includes a set of Russian sables which came to her as a present from the Emperor and Empress of Russia.

Almost every known fur is represented. She wears chiefly the sables, and never dons ermine, even as trimmings, except on official occasions, for tho it is the regal fur she makes no secret of the fact that it is the only one she does not consider beautiful.

The queen's dresses are almost all adorned with fur, either edging the bodices or as bands finishing the skirt. In fact, when asked once what she would wear on a yachting trip she answered absent mindedly "rather or think something with a bit of fur on it."

While the court is at Windsor for the brief Easter recess Princess Mary is taking further lessons in the riding school attached to the castle. She is already expert in handling a pony and has never shown any trace of the nervousness which for many years characterized Queen Mary, and which has prevented her from every really enjoying riding.

To the delight of all varieties of cross saddle riding, Princess Mary is being taught to ride astride and she wears a divided skirt. King George has pronounced views on the ordinary methods of teaching girls to ride, considering it dangerous and ungraceful. His approval of the cross saddle for women will mean that it will be adopted in riding schools and throughout the country.

As a matter of fact, the King was the original instructor of his daughter in this way of sitting on a horse for the first time she mounted a pony it was her father who lifted her on the boy's saddle he had made for her, and it was he who led the pony down Main Avenue at Sandringham, pointing out to his daughter the proper way to sit and to hold the reins.

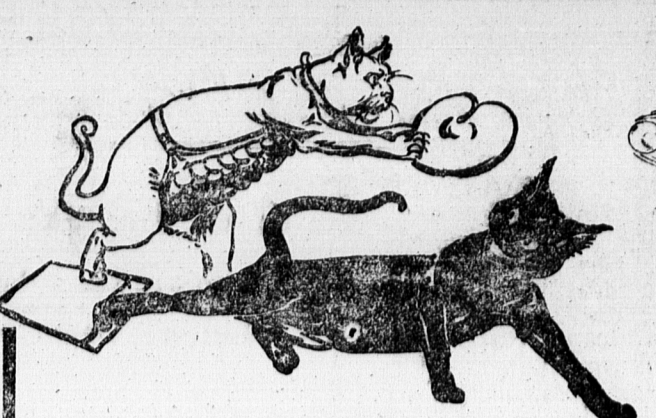
