FOUR LIVES ENDED BY STRYCHNINE

DANVILLE, Ill., March 24.—Robert Strawser, of Flora, near here, gave his three children strychnine and then ended his own life by swallowing a large quantity of the drug. Relatives of the dead man are at a loss to assign a cause for the deed. Mrs. Strawser returned from a short visit with neighbors to find the bodies of her husband and three children stretched out on the floor dead. An investigation resulted in the discovery of an empty bottle which had contained several ounces of strychnine.

INVENTOR'S SON IS EXONERATED

SAN DIEGO, Cal., March 24.—Wm. G. Morse, son of the inventor of telegraphic, will be released from prison tomorrow, according to reports received from Escondido, Lower California today. Morse has been in jail at Escondido since last December, when he shot and killed an Indian camp attendant who had attacked him.
