Lord Northampton presided, and speakers from Yukon, Brazil, India and China addressed the large assembly. I leave for Paris on Friday, spend a week there, and then on to Rome. The enclosed card shows that I was honored with a seat on the platform because of my congregation's many years of giving. I attended great meetings of the Baptist Union of England and Wales last week and heard nearly all their leaders, F. B. Meyer, J. G. Greenhough, J. H. Shakespeare, T. E. Ruth and others.
