CITY HOSPITAL BAZAAR OPENS SUCCESSFULLY

Largest Opening Night Crowd In History Of Event In Attendance.

The largest opening night crowd ever in attendance were at the Market Building last night for the opening of the 5th annual Charlottetown Hospital Bazaar. Rev. Dr. P. McMahon, D.D., presided and declared this much-looked-for event to annual event officially open. J. J. MacMillan, Chief-of-Staff of the Charlottetown Hospital was also heard in brief remarks.

The main event of the evening was the appearance of Big Ben Hokea, of Honolulu, King of the Hawaiian Guitar in songs and instrumental selections. During his first appearance, Hokea was enthusiastically received, especially by the children whom he had indulged in some community singing to his last appearance. The artist pleased the large crowd immensely. Combined with his pleasing personality Mr. Hokea has a rich voice which held his audience spellbound during the various numbers he rendered.

Think it was a big hit with old and young alike goes without saying and as he sings each night of the bazaar those who missed his selections last evening should make it a point to be on hand in the future and have the privilege of hearing one of the finest vocalists ever to appear in the City.

Rev. Dr. P. McMahon, in officially opening the bazaar, stated the purpose of the bazaar namely in helping the Charlottetown Hospital in carrying out one of the greatest of all charitable works in the care of the sick and the infirm. The speaker paid tribute to the people of Charlottetown, and of the whole Island in general for their generous support of the four years of the bazaar which has been in existence and he felt sure the Reverend Father stated that the generous spirit of co-operation which had been so evident in the past would again be to making the bazaar the biggest and best yet.

Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, Chief-of-Staff of the Charlottetown Hospital in his opening remarks welcomed back to the City Father William Enright of the Redemptorist Fathers who has lately succeeded Rev. Father Thomas (John) Halloran as head of the Holy Redeemer Church, Charlottetown.

Dr. MacMillan on behalf of the Sisters and the Charlottetown Hospital thanked the people for their generous support of the charitable work that the Hospital is carrying on. "But for this bazaar, the Hospital would not be able to carry on the speaker stated, and if that ever happens it would indeed be a great calamity." The speaker knew it wasn't necessary to make an appeal to the people as they knew that the demand made on the Hospital was becoming greater each year. Modern scientific equipment necessary to combatting diseases was necessary if the patients were to obtain the best treatment possible and this was one of the means of obtaining the necessary finances.

In closing the speaker again thanked the people for their generous support in the past and he fully believed that this year's bazaar would be the best ever to be held.

The various booths were well patronized by the large crowd during the evening. Games, home cooking, refreshments, fancy work, etc., were well patronized and booths displaying grand prizes that are to be given away drew much favorable comment.

The Charlottetown Fire Department last night, in order not to disappoint their regular patrons, held their regular bingo after consulting the bazaar committee, but afterwards turned over the proceeds to the Bazaar Committee. A gesture which was very much appreciated and is also noteworthy.

The door prize last night was won by Mr. Dan McDonald, City, with ticket No. 291.

Monday evening District Governor Larry Allen of Presque Isle, Me. accompanied by Mrs. Alline arrived in the city and held a conference with the District Chairman and Secretary, Mr. Neil D. MacLennan.

District Governor Alline was elected last year and has made official visits to the Charlottetown Club and is no stranger to the members.

He is President of the Maine Public Service Company and Vice President of the Maine and New Brunswick Electric Power Company. The program is given in full in today's paper, and there are also sketches of some of the leading Rotarians including the founder of Rotary, Paul Harris, International President, George C. Hager; International Representative W. J. Cairns; and International Secretary Chesley C. Perry.

Another distinguished visitor includes his Excellency Lewis O. Barrows, state Governor of Maine who is accompanied by A. B. Beck, banker, commissioner of that State, and Dr. F. W. Patterson of Acadia University and Charles Hunt, St. John's, Past International Director.

The Founder of Rotary

Paul P. Harris, founder and president emeritus of Rotary International, Chicago, Illinois, was the first Rotary club in the world, in Chicago, February 23, 1905, suggesting the form of organization to three friends who, with him, instituted the first club. A national association was formed by a convention of the first sixteen clubs in August, 1910, at Chicago. Paul Harris was elected first president. The second convention was held at Portland, Oregon, August, 1911. An international association was formed in August, 1912, at Duluth, Minnesota, to provide for a charter of Rotarians in Canada, and London, England. Rotary International became the name of the organization by the adoption of a revised constitution at the Los Angeles convention of June, 1922, America.

Although Harris has devoted much of his time to Rotary he has also been a leader in civic and professional work. He is a member of the International Society for Crippled Children and has served as chairman of the Committee on Professional Ethics and member of the Council of the Chicago Bar Association and representative of the Chicago Bar Association at the International Congress of Law at the Hague. He has also been a member of the International Committee of the American Bar Association. He was one of the two recipients in 1934 of the Silver Buffalo Award of the Boy Scouts of America.

George C. Hager is secretary of the Consumers Company of Illinois, a position he has held since 1927. He is also president of the Chicago Federal Savings and Loan Association and an officer and director of many other corporations and is an active member of numerous trade associations in his business field. He was born in Bristol, Tennessee, and was educated at Kings College of Belmont, where he received his B. A. in 1911, and at the University of Tennessee, where he received his LL. B., in 1916.

In 1915 he was admitted to the bar in Tennessee and began the practice of law in Knoxville. Five years later he came to Chicago to become secretary and general counsel of the Cook County Supply Company and its several subsidiary corporations which were consolidated in 1921 with the Consumers Company. Under the consolidation, he assumed the post of secretary of the same.

During the World War he enlisted as a private soldier, later becoming a lieutenant in the Field Artillery, serving as a judge advocate. He is a Major (Res.) U. S. A.

Rotarian Hager became a member of the Rotary Club of Chicago in 1927. He has served as a member and chairman of many of the club committees; he was also a director and president of the club. He was a member of the foundation committee in 1923-24, and served as a director in 1933-34. He was a member of the executive committee of Rotary International in 1933-34 and filled unexpired terms in 1934-35 and in 1935-37; and as a member of the finance committee and chairman of the investment committee in 1934. He served as chairman of the convention of the club in 1935 and in 1936-37; and was re-appointed a member of that committee for 1937-38. He was elected president of Rotary International at the convention held June 19 to 24 at San Francisco, California.

William J. Cairns is assistant vice-president of The Bell Telephone Company of Canada, having been in the employ of that company since finishing school. He was born in Prescott, Ontario. Rotarian Cairns became a member of the Rotary Club of Ottawa in 1918 and is a past president of that club. In 1921-22 he served as a member of the boys work committee of Rotary International, in 1922-23 as a member of the Ottawa (old) and in 1923-24 as chairman of the Canadian advisory committee. He was transferred to Montreal, 1923 from Ottawa to Montreal.
