SENSATIONAL VICTORY FOR DENNY SHUTE

Sarazen, Defending P. G. A. Title Is Eliminated By Detroit Pro.

PARK CLUB, Buffalo, July 26—Gene Sarazen lost his U. S. Professional Golfers Association championship today when he was defeated, 4 and 3, in the second round of the 17th annual P. G. A. title chase by Al Watrous of Detroit.

All square at the end of the morning round, Watrous, who won the Canadian Open in 1922 and finished second to Bob Jones in the British Open in 1926, struck a streak of sub-par golf in the afternoon to close out on the chunky campaigner with a pair of birdies and a par on the last three holes.

Sarazen, winner of the title in 1922, 1923 and last year started out a heavy favorite to win from the 35-year-old Detroit pro and ruled the betting odds choice at 5 to 1. Watrous pulled away from him at the start of the second round. Stealing Gene's famous driving thunder and keeping his irons on a straight line for the pin.

Elimination of Sarazen was almost shadowed by the sensation of victory of Denny Shute of Philadelphia, 1933 British Open king, over "Little Poison" Laftoon of Denver. Shute ripped par to pieces in the morning round, shooting the 36 holes in 66 to stand six up and then had to maintain that pace to keep up with an eight-under-par performance turned in by Laftoon in the afternoon. Shute finally won, 3 and 2.

The par-busting battle between Shute and Laftoon was studied with the most sensational putting seen in the history of the tournament.

In the 34 holes, Shute used his trusty putter only 48 times. Two matches ended in the nature of upsets. Craig Wood of Hollywood, N. J., defeated Harry Cooper of Chicago, the sensation of the summer western medal play campaign, 4 and 3, and young Dick Metz of Chicago, eliminated his celebrated fellow-townsmen, Tommy Armour, a former P. G. A. title holder, 3 and 2.

Paul Runyan of White Plains, N. Y., conquered Victor Ghezzi of Deal, N. J., by 2 and 1 and was installed by Buffalo betting commissions as the favorite at odds of 2 to 1.

League - leading Stars Defeated By Falcons 5-3

Losers Nearly Tie It Up In Ninth But Brilliant Catch By Freddy Bradley Nips Rally.

Falcons put an end to the Stars losing streak last evening when they humbled the leaders of the City Baseball League 5 to 3 in one of the most exciting games of the season.

But it was a bitter struggle the losers waged before conceding defeat. A brilliant one-handed leaping stab of Hennessy's liner by Freddy Bradley put a halt to a Star uprising in the ninth and provided the game with as dramatic a finish as has been seen here in years.

Both teams displayed one of the best brands of ball of the season and though eight errors were committed, several sparkling plays more than made up for the miscues.

Stars were held to one run until the ninth, the counter coming in the fourth after two Falcon errors and a safe hit loaded the bases with only one down. Acorn was out at first but McFarlane issued his second pass of the inning to his rival, Goss, to keep Star hopes running high but Bradley's neat play on Hennessy's line drive settled the issue.

Archie McFarlane on the mound for the Falcons, won his second start in as many games, granting but six hits and but for the fourth and ninth when he seemed to weaken, was never in danger.

It was the first defeat for the Stars ace, Walter Goss. Walter was touched for ten safe blows but at that little fielding in the fourth inning could have prevented at least two runs.

Worthy of mention was the sparkling performance of "Had" McInnis at second base for the Falcons last evening. The young infielder handled some hard chances in a manner which speaks well for a bright diamond future.

(By Alan Gould Associated Press Sports Editor) NEW YORK, July 26—The world champion Giants, with characteristic recuperative spirit, saved an even break with the highly dangerous St. Louis Cardinals today by lifting a 6-3 decision after having their ace pitcher, Carl Hubbell, badly battered and dropping the first game of a doubleheader 7-2.

A crowd of 29,000 saw the rival pennant contenders battle each other to a standstill as the western invasion of the Polo Grounds ended. The Giants remained four games in front of the Cardinals, but the defeat of the second place Chicago Cubs in Brooklyn increased the champion's lead to 2-1-2 games.

Fat Freddy Fitzsimmons pitched the Giants to victory and an even break in the series after the Dean brothers, Paul and Dizzy, collaborated in another exhibition of their amazing mastery over Bill Terry's crew.
