The cars are very convenient. The motor is operated by steam and is the centre of a train of two or four cars. It is of 216 horse power and runs at 40 miles an hour. The driver, like an electric car motor-man, is at the front of the leading car, and there controls the train by levers. He can reverse the machinery and operate it from the other end for the return trip.
