### WANTS P. E. ISLAND VACANCY FILLED

OTTAWA, Jan. 20—The first reading was given in parliament today to E. N. Lewis' bill to require a load limit to limit cargoes on the Great Lakes.

Conditions in the Kingston penitentiary were again brought to the attention of parliament by Mr. Edwards, of Frontenac, who recently complained that discharged convicts were sent away with insufficient clothing. He stated that the great coats of the penitentiary guards cost only \$2.50 each, and that there was not a sufficient provision of medicine.

Sir Alan Aylesworth said that he believed the convicts got all the medicine they required and the reason the great coats cost so little was because they were made by convicts. A. L. Fraser, Conservative, of P. E. I., complained that there was a vacancy in the Island's representation in the senate which had existed since the death of Senator Ferguson, two years ago. He said, as the representation of the province in the commons had seriously declined it was desirable in the interests of the Island that the representation in the upper house should be maintained. In addition to the vacancy referred to there was another practical vacancy caused by the physical disability of Senator Robertson, who was unable to come to Ottawa. He urged that the vacancy should be filled without delay.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier said that there were so many matters of great importance engaging the attention of the government that it might be pardoned for not having filled the senate vacancy referred to. He promised that there would be as little further delay as possible.

Mr. Barnard, Conservative, of British Columbia, declared that poaching in British Columbia waters had become a "systematic business," and Hon. Mr. Brodeur declared that within a short time the department of marine and fisheries would be in a position to cope with the situation and would do so.

Mr. Loggie was told by the minister of marine that no concessions had been made by Canada relative to licenses in the recent fishery negotiations. The foreign office had expressed the view that Canada could not insist upon licenses being taken out by foreigners, but the United States representatives, after hearing the reasons advanced by the Canadian delegates, had accepted the condition that licenses should be required.

### N. Y. BANDITS ROB GUEST

NEW YORK, Jan. 20—An unusual hold-up was successfully pulled off in a fashionable section of uptown New York a little before 1 o'clock this morning. Mrs. Frances Elliott, a wealthy society woman had been entertaining guests at her home in West-56th street and they were putting on their wraps when five men pushed their way through the open door. With drawn revolvers the intruders lined up the hostess and her guests in train robber fashion and proceeded to go through the pockets of the men and the hand-bags of the women, now and then pausing to remove a tempting piece of jewelry. The robbers secured \$250 in money and jewellery valued at about \$2,500.

### COPPER MAGNATE'S BRIDE IN SANITARIUM

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., Jan. 19—Fear that an attempt would be made to kidnap her child is responsible for the illness of Mrs. Bernice Golden Heinze, wife of F. Augustus Heinze, the copper capitalist. It has been announced that Mrs. Heinze was in an hospital here, suffering from a nervous breakdown, but the circumstances that led to her illness have just become known. Mrs. Heinze was in such terror that her child would be kidnaped that she finally placed it in a convent in Monroe (Mich.), and has been worrying over the child's safety since taking this step.

### OFFER MCCURDY \$3,000 TO FLY FROM KEY WEST

HAVANA, Jan. 20—The city council of Havana today voted a purse of \$3,000 to be awarded to J. A. D. McCurdy, the Canadian aviator, in case he makes a successful flight in a heavier than air machine next week from Key West to Havana. Mr. McCurdy is expected to arrive in Havana tomorrow on the United States torpedo boat destroyer Paulding for the purpose of selecting a suitable landing place, and making other arrangements in connection with his proposed flight.

### SERIOUS COLLISION REPORTED

FRANKFORT, Germany, Jan. 23—The Zeitung's Constantinople correspondent reports a serious collision between British sailors and Turks at Dubuia in the Indian Ocean. Several bluejackets were killed. The British afterwards bombarded Dubuia.

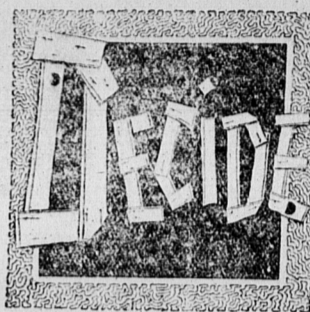
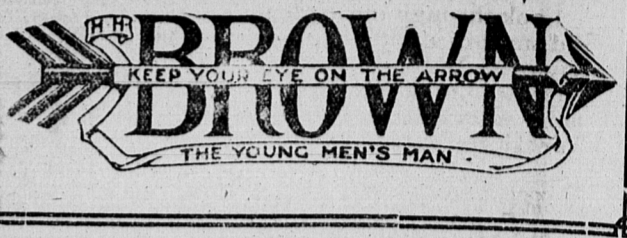

### HEROISM TO COST HIS LIFE

borough is dying at Point Judith of tuberculosis which he contracted at that time. His only companion during those days of heroism was a dog with whom he shared his slender dog-wisdoms.

Loughborough was assistant keeper of the light. On the 23rd of February, 1910, John R. Klarkson, the keeper of the light, left for Norwalk to lay in a stock of provisions, Loughborough being left in charge of the light. The keeper was to return that night. Instead of doing so, however, he went to Bridgeport, where he celebrated his liberty. He was arrested two weeks later charged with signing Loughborough's name to a salary order and collecting the cash.

As the night wore on and the keeper failed to return, Loughborough kept his lonely vigil, with no one for company but his dog. Day after day wore on and the provisions began to get low, and every day Loughborough shared with the dog, determined that they both should have an equal chance of living.

He was unable to leave the light, as he had no boat, and he tried vainly to attract attention by flying the flag inverted. On account of the thick fog, however, this could not be seen by passing vessels, and after the tenth day the heroic keeper collapsed. The following day, John S. Hayward, assistant superintendent of lights, found Loughborough lying on the floor near the engine unconscious.

Loughborough was taken to a hospital and revived, but he never regained strength. A few weeks ago he was removed from the hospital to Narragansett Pier. The physicians, however, hold out no hopes of his recovery.

### EXPRESS RATE TO BE REDUCED

panies have held back up to the present, because the customs regulations at the Canadian border necessitate so much extra work that a reduction in existing rates would, in many cases, work a hardship.

All the important companies were represented, including the Adams, Canadian, American, National, Northern, Southern, Western, Pacific and United States companies, Wells and Fargo & Company, and the New York & Boston despatch. The announcement made at the close of the conference follows in part:

"Instead of two companies which may handle an express package, making a separate charge on each line, the charge will be the same as if one company had carried the package from shipping point to destination."

In discussing the announcement one of the conferees said: "It has always been customary when express shipments were handled by two companies between which joint rates were not in effect to make the charge equal the sum of the local charges to each company. Under the new plan, the charges between all offices will be the same as if one company had carried the package from shipping point to point of the destination. This will effect a radical reduction in express charges on all as exclusive offices, that is to say, points where but one express company is represented."
