### PARDONS AND PAROLES.

During the past seven years a new policy of dealing with the convicts in the penitentiaries has been adopted, and an era of pardons, commutations and paroles has been entered upon. W. P. Archibald was appointed Parole Officer and being a very humane man as well as a very industrious and energetic official, who has brought successive Ministers of Justice to his way of thinking, he has gone on depicting the penitentiary population at an increasing and altogether remarkable rate. We are now passing through an era of so-called humanitarian treatment for the criminal class that is entirely unexampled in Canadian history.

Prisoners convicted of the gravest crimes have their sentences commuted by executive clemency to life imprisonment; thereafter there comes a shortening of the terms of both life prisoners and term prisoners on account of "good conduct" in prison, and to this has been added the parole system, under which the convict is released from duration on condition of making a monthly report to the police authority where he resides, and also reporting any change of residence he may seek to make. Under the parole system alone in seven years sixteen hundred prisoners have been released from the Canadian penitentiaries. About three hundred were thus released last year, or one for each working day. One thousand of the sixteen hundred, we are told, are now at large with a clean sheet. While five hundred more are reporting regularly to the authorities and leading orderly lives.

The Parole Office is enthusiastic over the working of the new policy. Out of the 1600 paroled only 33 have returned to a life of crime, we are told, and 87,000 hours have forfeited their liberty by failing to comply with the conditions of their parole and have been recommitted to penal servitude. They are each allowed "one break," and it is for the second that they are thus recommitted and must then fulfill their complete term of sentence. This is a very favorable showing on paper, and would go to show that the Parole Officer has been both careful and fortunate in the selections he has made for parole. But, regrettably there is another side to this question. It will yet be found in its effect upon the criminal population of the country. And we fear the ill-effect has already begun.

Serious crime is increasing from year to year in Canada. We think it extremely probable that this condition results in part at least from the parole system. A convict goes to the penitentiary now with the strong hope that the judge's sentence of death will be commuted to life imprisonment, and that in turn reduced to a lesser term. If sentenced for three, seven, ten or twenty years he feels that in reality he will not serve half so long. Thus the terror of the law is taken away and with it one of the great preventives of crime. Judges and juries doing their duty faithfully have their work undone by a Parole Officer who liberates prisoners faster than the courts send them in. In scores of cases peaceful communities throughout Canada are in fear of re-

ed convicts who have not served out half their sentences, while in other cases good citizens are afraid to make complaint where grave offences are committed, lest the guilty party, paroled after a brief term, may return to wreak vengeance. This is the other side.

We believe the Parole Officer is conscientious, but more in need of a wholesome check in his operations than of further commendation. The Government is of course, responsible for the paroles and pardons, which are fast tending to reduce the verdicts of juries and the sentences of judges to a farce. Why should any one man be clothed with such power, or admitted to have such influence with the Government as to enable him to practically revise every punitive sentence delivered by our courts? This is a time when crime is increasing in the land and the influx of a large alien population, makes it doubly imperative that the punishment for grave offences shall be both adequate and certain.

The quarrel and litigation between the Steel and Coal Companies in Nova Scotia is a matter of general regret, injurious to the interests of both, and detrimental to the public interest as well. It ought to have been settled long ago.

Georgia has now enacted prohibitory law, an event which twenty-five years ago would have been thought impossible. It is noteworthy that in no parts of the Great Republic have temperance principles made more rapid strides of late than in the Southern States.

Government House and its surroundings at this season of the year are charmingly attractive. The Lieutenant Governor and Mrs. McKinnon are always happy in contributing to the enjoyment of their guests and were never more so than during the At Home of Wednesday evening, which will linger long in the minds of many as a refreshing memory. The best social circles of the City and Province were as usual well represented in the assemblage of guests among whom it was a pleasure to meet Mr. McDonald of Dalry and his party including Miss Boal and Mrs. Hopkins. Mr. McDonald has for years made his summer home on the Island, as we hope he may do for years to come, finding health comfort and rest while adding distinction and interest to the social circle during his stay.

Seventy years a doctor is the record of Dr. William Bayard of St. John, and the anniversary has been duly honored by the Medical Society there. Long and eminent as has been his service in his profession there has been added to it in the case of Dr. Bayard much other important work for the community and a life without fear and above reproach.

Dr. McNeill writes The Patriot in regard to the joint worm which has extensively infested the wheat crop of the Island. There is only one annual generation of these insects and they winter in the stubble. It is useless to plant wheat on soil thus infested. The Ottawa Department of Agriculture should be consulted as to the best means of eradicating the pest, but it may be doubted whether the Dominion could undertake to make good the farmers' losses.

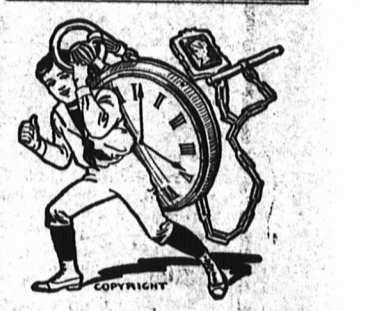
