The steamer Caspacia, which replaces the Campana on the route between Montreal and Maritime province ports, arrived in Quebec on Sunday night last from Grenock, Scotland. The Caspacia, which is practically a new boat, is 246 feet long, 38 feet beam and 1182 tons registered. A much larger boat in freight and passenger accommodation than the Campana, the latter accommodation carrying favorably with the best ocean liners, cabins and saloons being much larger, brighter and better finished than those of the Campana. She is lighted by electricity and heated by steam throughout. Her facilities for handling cargo are of the latest designs, freight being discharged through four discharging ports on each side. Capt LaChance, formerly captain of the Campana, is in charge of the new boat, having brought her out from the old country. The Caspacia is at present loading cargo at Montreal and will leave there on her first trip on Monday next and will be due in Summerside about Thursday evening.—Exe.

DRUNKEN MAN INJURES BOY

WORCESTER, May 4.—Worcester's toll to the liquor license opening is one probable fatality and this an innocent child who was assaulted by a drunken man.

Daniel L. McAuliffe, 24 years old, while under the influence of liquor attempted to get on the seat of the wagon driven by Frank Yates, a contractor, who had a four-year-old boy, Frank, on the seat with him. Mr. Yates succeeded in forcing McAuliffe out of the rear end of the wagon whereupon the latter took a half-filled whiskey bottle from his pocket and threw it at Yates with considerable force. Yates dodged the bottle but it struck his boy in the back of his head fracturing the skull.

Mr. Yates took the boy to the hospital where the extent of the injury was determined, and he was given no hope for the boy's recovery. McAuliffe was arrested late tonight for drunkenness and ordered held for court pending the outcome of the boy's injury.
