OBITUARY.—The funeral of the late Jas. C. Gourlie, Tignish, who passed to his rest on Saturday, 28th ult., took place last Sunday afternoon, and was very largely attended. The service was conducted by Rev. D. McDonald, assisted by Rev. James Murray. The deceased who has been in his 62nd year, was a native of Glasgow, Scotland, having emigrated to this Island some 40 years ago. Mr. Gourlie was a man of considerable intellectual ability, and possessed many amiable qualities, and will be much missed in the community over which his sudden and untimely death has cast a deep shadow of gloom. To his sorrowing wife and family we extend our sincerest sympathy.

MANUEL SCHOOL

Established in Ottawa by Prof. Robertson.

CH'TOWN TO HAVE ONE

The School Will Not Interfer With Apprenticeship or System of Trade.

(Ottawa Citizens.)

Prof. Robertson, who is busily engaged arranging for the experimental work in connection with the scheme of Sir W. C. McDonald, of Montreal, to introduce manual training classes in Canadian public schools, has completed plans for introducing it in Ottawa at the commencement of the fall and winter term. The upper flat of the new wing of the O. A. A. C. building has been secured and a class of thirty boys will be drawn from Elgin, Kent and Waller street schools.

Classes will be started at other points in Canada, including one at Truro, Nova Scotia, one in Fredericton, New Brunswick, two in Prince Edward Island, one at Knolton, Que., and one at Waterloo, Que., one at Winnipeg, Man., one at Calgary, N. W. T., and one in British Columbia at either Vancouver or Victoria.

Mr. L. H. Bennett, of London, Eng., who is to have charge of the work in Quebec, is in the city, stopping at the Windsor. Mr. Bennett is engaged in sorting out and arranging the supplies for the several schools. Speaking to a representative of the Citizen, Mr. Bennett said that the class would engage the time of the pupil for half a day each week. It is intended to introduce a graded course in wood work. The main object of the course is to train the eye and hand, and to educate the mind to reason out the more scientific phrase of mechanics. The school will not interfere with the apprenticeship system for trades, nor is a trade taught in any degree. The finished product, when there is such a thing, is generally presented to the scholar as a recognition of merit, just the same as the kindergarten tots are allowed to take home the fancy work they make. It is intended to follow the English system and there will be no occasion for opposition from labor men as is the case in the United States. No boy on finishing his public school education will be able to work as a carpenter, but, if he decides to follow that vocation, should make a better apprentice and more skilled mechanic on account of his earlier education. It is the aim of the system to be of use to any vocation which may afterwards be followed by the public should it be a trade, profession or otherwise. A class for the instruction of teachers is in progress at present at Brockville, to which all public school teachers are welcome.
